It was at Wolf's house, or hut, the hunters first stopped, and after remaining over night they started out the next morning, laden with such provisions only as they needed on such expeditions, but as they expected to return to Wolf's place that night they left their blankets behind.

Together the rescurers carried Powell down to Wolf's place, a distance of several miles, and then they returned for Hoeye, who was unable to walk. They did not reach'the cabin until late that night, and they found Powell was dead. A doctor living about 12 miles away was sent for next morning and on making examination stated that amputation of Hoeye's fest and possibly his hands would be necessary. The suffering man was quieted by the use of epiates, and was then taken home in Fox valley.
