## Salaries of County Officers.

The new law for the payment of county officers by salary instead of fees, which will go into effect July 1, 1894, makes a big reduction in Linn, and a good many other counties. In several counties the salaries will be so low that the number of office seekers promises to be hereafter noticeably less.

In Multnomah county the clerks of county and circuit court will receive \$3500 each with \$3000 for deputies.

The salaries of recorder will remain about the same as they now receive for fees. In Linn county the salary is \$1800.

The annual salary of sheriff of Tillamook county is the smallest in the list, being \$1200, and Multnomah county is the largest, being \$4500. The salary in Linn county is \$3000, Lane \$3000 and Marion \$3000 with two deputies at \$1500.

In all county offices where no salary is fixed, as is the case in Linn county, the compensation of the necessary deputies will be fixed by the county court.

County clerks are allowed to charge, in addition to their salary, ten cents per folio for making copies of records for private parties, and sheriffs are allowed to receive any reward offered for capturing criminals, also pay for boarding prisoners for transporting convicts and insane persons to the capitol and the traveling expense incurred in going into another county or state after criminals. All other fees are to be collected and immediately turned over to the county treasurer. No change is made in the compensation of county treasurer, coroner, assessor and school superintendent. The law does not affect any present office holder.
