Nathalia Baltimore, the wife of W. U. Baltimore, and daughter of E. and M. Bosler, was born July 4th 1868, in Grant county, Indiana. In 1870 her parents removed from Indiana to Kansas where they lived until 1884, at which time they moved to Oregon, she accompanying them. She became a member of the Brethren church in November 1883. She lived a very devoted Christian life. Her life was indeed beautiful; always kind and affectionate, never without a kind word, all were made to feel the sunlight of her presence.

She was married to W. U. Baltimore January 1st 1882. She has been a great sufferer for the last two years. Although her sufferings were intense, she bore them with a spirit of sweet patience supernatural. For the last four months of her life she was confined to her bed almost incessantly. But notwithstanding her great sufferings she deliberately directed the manner of her burial—specifying a favorite piece of music that she desired sung. She expressed herself as ready and glad to go and be with the Lord. She died March 1st 1893 at 9:30 p. m., and was followed by a large concourse of relatives and friends to the grave in the Masonic Cemetery at Lebanon, on the afternoon of March 2nd 1893.
