Judge Deady's Successor.

The nomination of Hon. Charles B. Bellinger as United States district judge, to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Judge M. P. Deady, was sent to the senate by the president Tuesday morning.

Charles B. Bellinger was born in Maquon, Knox county, Ill., on November 21, 1839, and at the age of 8 years came to Oregon with his parents and grandparents. He began to read law at Salem in the office of Judge B. F. Bonham, and was admitted to the bar at the September term of the supreme court in 1863.

Mr. Bellinger soon after gave up the law business and became the editor of the Arena. Mr. Bellinger's health becoming impaired he retired from the editorial work in 1866 and engaged in the mercantile business at Monroe, in Benton county, until 1869, serving in the meantime, in 1868, a term in the legislature as a representative from Benton county.

A year later he moved to Albany and began the practice of law, taking editorial control of the States Rights Democrat. He remained in charge of that paper until 1870, when he removed to Portland and began the practice of law. Since that time Bellinger has made his home in Portland.

Judge Bellinger was in the Modoc Indian wars, gaining considerable honor.

In 1878 he was appointed clerk of the supreme court. In the fall of 1878 he resigned the supreme court clerkship to accept the judicial judgeship of the fourth judicial district.

Upon retiring from the bench Judge Bellinger resumed the practice of law in partnership with John M. Gearin, and so continued until the fall of 1883, when he became a member of the firm of Dolph, Bellinger, Mallory & Simon. He was married in early life to Miss Margery S. Johnson, of Linn county.
