William Henderson, who killed Cyrus Suter in a saloon at Cat by last fall, and who was convicted of murder in the first degree at the November term of court at Oregon City, and the verdict reversed in the supreme court, was permitted to enter a plea of murder in the second degree, and, waving time, was sentenced to the penitentiary for life on Monday, and taken to the pen in the evening. The supreme court ruled that the evidence was clearly against premeditated murder, and that the killing was the result of a quarrel forced by Suter.

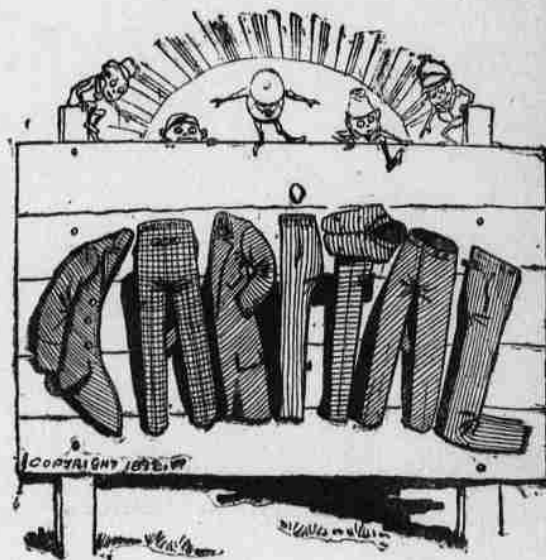
