County Court.

In the matter of the resolutions of Linn County Council of H in regard to county road crossings over railroad tracks, ordered that supervisors furnish the county court with a list of the railroad crossings, and improvements necessary to be made on each.

In the matter of the application of Nance Cook and J. A. Melville for the location and vacation of a county road, ordered that on satisfactory proof of the road being constructed as required by law and payment of charges, said road being declared a public highway.

James Carey of Crawfordville, was appointed supervisor of road district No. 40.

The contract for building a bridge across Muddy Creek west of Shedd was let to Duncan & Jensen at \$200, and the contract for a bridge across the South Santiam at Rock Creek was awarded to J. R. Tillotson at \$1420.

Witness fees in state cases in circuit court allowed.

The costs in the Wasson murder trial were \$1354.

Application of H. E. Cady et al for location of county road, granted and road opened.

The contract for furnishing wood for the court house was let to W. A. Williamson at \$3 for 40 cords of oak and \$2.75 for body fir, \$130 in all.

In application of John Bleich et al for location of county road, petitioners allowed to amend proof of publication of notice.

Tuesday the state prison board paid for and had turned over to the state stove foundry plant of the North-east Foundry Co. at the state prison. The price paid for the plant was \$40,000, and aside from this there was purchased from the foundry company material to the amount of \$8,700. For this the board paid actual cost—that is, what it actually cost the company. The material consisted of pig iron, coal, etc., which was on hand at the time the prison labor contract expired. The material will all be required right away in the operation of the foundry. Mr. Lowenberg, representing the foundry company, was in Salem and received payment for the plant and turned it over to the board for the state. Now the active work of manufacturing stoves by the state will be commenced in real earnest and a full force of hands will be put on just as soon as some necessary material is arrive.

A trial of road machines at Corvallis the other day resulted in the purchase, at a cost of \$600, of two of the machines by the county court, for use on the public roads of Benton county. They are to be paid out of the fund distributed by the last legislature among the counties of the state, of which Benton county got \$600. In one trial a quarter of a mile of road 30 feet was made by three men and eight horses in a trifle less than five hours.
