## PRINEVILLE NEWS.

Burns papers say winter still linger in Harney valley.  
 Crook county sends two more representatives to Salem this week.

The sheep shearing season has now begun, and wool growers report excellent fleeces.

Abe Hackleman sent a fine stallion from Albany to his rancho on Camp Creek.

A Hackleman will come across the Cascades with 300 head of cattle as soon as he can cross the snow. He is now at the edge of the snow on the west side of the mountains.

Lee Wigle was over from Warm Spring during the week. He says the Indians' grain on the agency is looking fine—far in advance of the grain here—but the crickets are again making their appearance in that section, and it is feared they will destroy the crops.

For the first time in twenty years crook county ranchers are complaining of too much rain. Many of them have not finished their spring seeding, and for the past three weeks the ground having been too wet to cultivate they are desirous of a little dry weather.

The first wool shipped out of Crook county this season belonged to Allen & Nye and was shipped by M. Siebel & Co. last Wednesday.

Mrs. R. K. Nelson, of Mitchell, was in town Wednesday making final proof on two land claims. She came across the mountains on horseback.

Court adjourned last Monday night and Judge Bradshaw and District Attorney Wilson left on Tuesday's stage for their home in The Dalles.

Joe Claypool visited his Fish Lake rancho recently and found the roofs of all his buildings crushed by the snow. On Sand mountain he found 18 feet of snow.

On Thursday morning Sheriff Booth started to the penitentiary with Wm. Ash and Ellis Wheeler. He took J. H. Crooks and G. W. Murphy along for Guards.

Last Monday complaint was made Justice Elliott's court charging Marion W. Orsborn with swearing falsely on the trial of Ellis Wheeler last week. A warrant for his arrest was placed in the hands of P. B. Poindecker who arrested Orsborn and brought him before Justice Elliott Thursday for examination. After hearing the testimony the Justice held him in bonds of \$300 to appear before the next grand jury.
