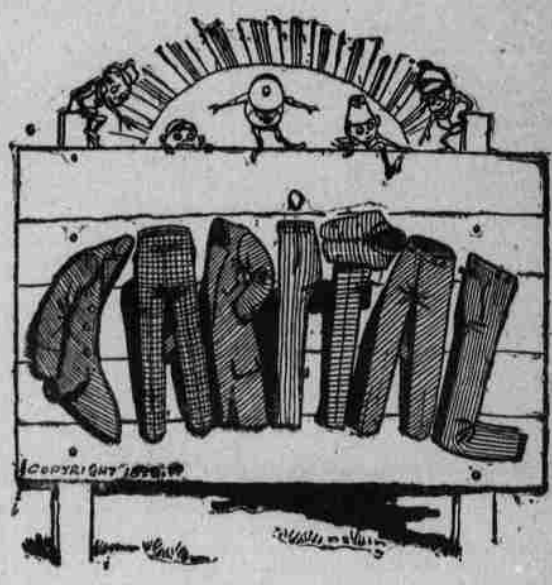

The liabilities amount to \$228 and the assets to \$2930, mostly in accounts and notes. The immediate cause for the assignment was the recent fire at Sweet Home, which burned the Hamilton buildings and stock except about \$350 worth of goods taken out.
