 While the state of South Carolina is engaged in the liquor traffic, the far western state of Oregon has gone quite deeply into the soda-water business.
 The little burg of Sodaville is blessed with a natural soda spring, and the last legislature, in its infinite wisdom, provided that "inasmuch as there is a great and growing demand on the part of the public for the waters of said spring," the state would expend \$500 to improve it.

This, of course, gives the state a first lien on the fountain and provides free soda for the Oregonians, unless it should be subsequently voted to levy a duty on this natural product of the earth.

This action of the state in taking possession of the natural soda spring may very likely be hailed as a nationalistic precedent in some quarters, but it is just as well for the advocates of Bellamyism not to be too sanguine. One state-owned soda spring doesn't necessarily mean a revolution.

The Fruit Situation.
 From The Statesman.

At the present time the outlook for green fruits of all kinds seems favorable. The apple crop of the west is deficient and Montana dealers are ordering apples from this valley, Southern Oregon. S. A. Clarke shipped a mixed car with 130 boxes of apples, last week. The demand for Bartlett pears secures growers an offer of one and one-half cents per pound from Portland dealers, but the quotations from Chicago are \$2.00 and \$2.50 a box this week, a sharp advance on August prices. All plums and prunes have advanced; California has few plums or Bartlett pears left, so Oregon has no competitor for her pears and late plums. Quotations for Hungarian prunes in New York were \$1.30 per twenty-pound crates. This gives growers two and one-half cents for the fruit, net. The Earl fruit company anticipates good prices for Italian prunes, as they come late and none are grown save in the Pacific Northwest. A great many young orchards are beginning to bear where the growers have not prepared to dry the fruit, and will be glad to realize fair prices, so it is thought many car-loads of Italian, Hungarian and silver prunes will go east from Oregon.
