About 8:30 Monday evening a fire alarm was sounded and it was found that the dwelling occupied by E. E. Parrish and family on First and Baker streets was on fire in the rear. The department responded quickly, but could get no water for some time, and in the meantime the flames had gained a good start. The house was about half-consumed, and some of the contents, though a piano and a good deal of furniture was carried out. The house was owned by D. B. Monteith, and was not insured. The contents were insured for \$1500 in the Farmers and Merchants. The loss on the house is about \$1000. When the fire was discovered the house was locked up and the occupants were out in town. The doors and windows had to be broken in to effect an entrance. Charles Murphy was run over by the chemical engine but was not badly hurt.—Herald.

### The Brownsville Land Case.

The matter of the title to the land upon which the town of North Brownsville stands, which was filed upon a few months ago by a man named Munk, who essayed to gobble it up under an alleged defect in title, the facts of which were published at that time, has been placed in the hands of Representative Hermann by the citizens of North Brownsville. It involves the title to the entire town. When the town was located it was understood that the title to the land was in the Oregon & California Railroad Company, although originally assumed to be in the state under indemnity school land selections. Conveyances have been made by the state as well as by the railroad company and lots sold under these titles. The government, however, declined to approve the state as well as railroad selections, and the people find themselves without valid title. Representative Hermann has attempted relief through the department, but without avail, and has now resorted to legislative relief in congress. His plan, as outlined in the bill introduced a few days ago, is to authorize Oliver P. Coshow, of North Brownsville, who is the assignee from the railroad company, to make payment of \$2.50 per acre to the government, and make entry of 162 acres specially described, upon first giving 30 days' notice of his intention to make entry, and thereafter he shall make and deliver to each person claiming to own property in North Brownsville the record title to which property shall have been derived from any attempted conveyances by the school superintendent, and the Oregon & California Railroad Company. The entry when made shall be transmitted by the Oregon City land office to the commissioner of the general land office, and upon satisfactory showing to him that deeds have been tendered by the entryman to the various property-holders, patent shall issue to Oliver P. Coshow.

If the following from the Corvallis Daily News is correct, there will be lively boating on the Willamette this winter: "We learn that there will be seven boats on the river this season running up from Portland. The O. P. company will have the Hoag and the Sisters on the upper river, the latter probably running up as far as Eugene, and the former to Corvallis. The company will also run the Elwood from Portland to Salem. Then there are the Altotona, Ramona, Toledo, Willamette Chief and Manzanilla, which will also run out of Portland, the two former as far up as Eugene and the latter exclusively for the Corvallis flouring mills, while the other two will carry freight between points. Under these circumstances boating will be lively on the river this winter."
