An Important Decision

It will be remembered that the question as to whether the money depos ited with Hamilton, Job & Co. was a trust fund or not, was argued several days ago before Judge Fullerton, who took the matter under advisement. A decision was sent, sustaining the plaintiff's demurrer to the several separate defenses set up by the assignce of H. J. & Co., thereby holding the county money a trust fund and giving the county a priority over the general de-positors. The College case stands on the same ground and this decision in effect gives the College the same priority. In the set off cases the court made a decision sustaining the objections to the set offs, holding that no set offs could be alleged.
