DEMOCRAT CONVENTION. The democrat county convention assembled at the court house in Albany last Wednesday to nominate a county ticket and elect delegates to the state democrat convention. The convention was called to order by Mart Miller, chairman of the county central committee, who stated the object of the convention. T. J. Stites was elected chairman and D. P. Mason, secretary of the convention. The committee appointed to select twelve names as suitable persons for delegates to the state convention, reported the following names who were selected: M A Miller, Dr. DuGas J K Weatherford, G W Wright, Henry Blakely, W H McClimurry, Wm Wigge, George Humphrey, D F Hoeye, Jeff Myers, Geo Findley and Owen Bond. For state senators—W R Blyeu, of Albany, and Jeff Myers, of Scio were nominated by acclamation. For representatives—J M Philippot, of Harrisburg, J J Whitney, of Albany, and Nelson Crume, of Halsey were nominated by acclamation. For county commissioner—W E Potter, of Lyons, and Phillip Swank were named. The ballot stood: Potter 67; Swank, 50. Potter was declared the nominee. For county clerk—N P Payne, of Albany, and C E Stanard, of Brownsville, were named. The ballot stood: Stanard 93; Payne 30. Mr. Stanard was declared the nominee. For recorder—R Shelton, of Scio, and A J Pitner, of Shedd, were named. E E Davis was nominated but declined. Ballot stood: Shelton, 104; Pitner, 19. For sheriff—C C Jackson was nominated by acclamation. For treasurer—E L Bryan, of Tangent, was nominated by acclamation. For assessor—S O Wallace, of Lebanon, R M Miller and Enoch Miller, were named: Ballot stood: Wallace, 66; R M Miller, 30; Enoch Miller, 27. Mr Wallace was declared the nominee. For school superintendent, L M Curi, of Albany, G H Wilkes, of Shedd, H H White, of Plainview, F M Mitchell, of Albany, and E J Morganson, of Santiam, were named. First ballot stood: Wilkes, 54; Mitchell, 29; Curi, 19; White, 29; Morganson, 4. Third ballot stood: Mitchell, 66; Wilkes, 57. Mr Mitchell was declared the nominee.
