These operations, he says, result in reducing a large proportion of the coal to sizes too small for commercial purposes, the percentage of waste from this source averaging as high as 20 per cent of the coal hoisted from the col-lisates this however period her conheries, this, however, having been somewhat dimmished in recent years by the utilization of the smaller sizes of coal.

ne tunns that this process—rescuing coal from the waste heaps—is destined to go much farther in the more general use of coal in fine particles.
