A TRIP TO UMATILLA.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE EXPRESS:

The session of the Grand Lodge, L. O. O. F., which was held at Pendleton, is over and the delegates have returned to their homes with the best wishes for the people of Pendleton, and will long remember the hospitality and favors extended us during our sojourn among them. Arriving at Pendleton on the morning of the 9th inst., we spent the time from then till the 15th in visiting old friends and looking over the country from Pendleton to Walla Walla. I heard from all a regret that times were so dull, but I found that 35-cent wheat had not driven the farmers of that section out of the wheat-raising business, for it is one continuous wheatfield. The prospect is good, but they dread the hot weather and winds which may damage their crops. I did not see any poor stock. The farm teams and stock were all fat. Most of the teams summer-fallowing were six horse walking gangs. I saw one twelve horse team plowing with a double gang, cutting four furrows. They plow from one to three miles around the field. The six horse teams averaging about five and one-half acres a day. I prefer old Linn to Umatillo, but shall long remember the trip for its pleasant memories and associations.

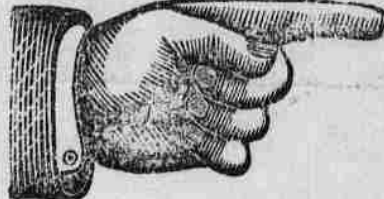
