RULES AND REGULATIONS.

After the citizens mass meeting at the City Hall Wednesday, of last week the new Water Co. adopted the following rules and regulations:
RULE 1.—No application for water will be entertained, except for irrigating purposes or sprinkling public streets, alleys and parks.
RULE 2.—All applications for water must be made to Mr. A. B. Nickerson in person or in case of his absence to Mr. Phil M. Smith.
RULE 3.—Dolph men can be supplied with hot water between 7 and 9 p. m., except Sunday, at Miller's City Drug store.
RULE 4.—The use of water for irrigating purposes must cease before 3 o'clock a. m.
RULE 5.—Sidewalk and streetsprinkling must be confined to the Santham bridge on the east, Eb Koebler's farm on the north, Frank Moist's farm on the west, and the Wither's place on south, and must in no case, be extended to Sodaville; as, in that case cold water might be thrown on Templeton's new county of Tumalum.
RULE 6.—Permission obtained from the company to use water shall be perpetual, and entitles the holder to use water for any purpose that they may see fit, and no one shall molest or make him afraid.
RULE 7.—Until further notice, no charge whatever will be made by the water company, for the use of water except the hot water provided for the Dolph men under Rule 3.
RULE 8.—The right to use water for drinking purposes shall not be denied the widows and orphans.
RULE 9.—When water is left running, and is stopped by freezing, a fine will be imposed upon the freezer or freezers, as the case may be.
RULE 10.—When water is used simply for squirting purposes, and no meter is used, it will be charged for at 8 cent per squirt.
RULE 11.—Yellow dogs found drinking from any hydrant will be subjected to a dose of Liver pills without the usual antidote.
RULE 12.—The right to revise, alter or amend these rules is hereby granted the patrons of the company.
