Eugene is organizing a bicycle club.

A cannery is being built at Gold Beach.

Peter Roberson, aged 84 years, died Sunday at Noti.

There are five cases of diphtheria in Forest Grove.

Newton Byron committed suicide at Ballston Thursday.

The Salvation Army will establish barracks in Pendleton.

A movement is on foot at Eugene to build a good courthouse.

Cattle are being purchased in Wallawa county for the Montana ranges.

The Medford brewery has started up again, after being idle several months.

Two young men at Talent have been fined \$5 each for placing red pepper on a stove.

The sawmill at Mooreville, after an idleness of several months, has resumed work.

The new gymnasium of the Willamette university at Salem was dedicated Friday night.

Four hundred Eagle valley cattle were shipped the past week from Baker City to Seattle.

A petition is being freely signed at Huntington to have that town annexed to Malheur county.

The Corvallis carriage works has turned out its first farm wagon, and it is all of Oregon wood.

Captain R. H. Parker, C company, Second regiment, at Eugene, has resigned his commission.

Lincoln county and the citizens of Elk City are jointly rebuilding the bridge at the latter place.

The fire departments of Eastern Oregon and Washington cities are making arrangements for a tournament.

Papers are being made out for the appeal of the confirmation of the O. P. sale to the supreme court.

The Indian war veterans will meet at McMinnville February 22, and will be addressed by Judge Capies.

Centerville and Greenville have been engaged in a rivalry for a creamery, and the former has been successful.

A subscription is being taken in Pendleton for a fund for the pension and relief association of the fire department.

The people of Cottage Grove, Creswell and vicinity have contributed about a carload of supplies for the Nebraska sufferers.

Eight hundred ounces of gold bullion, valued at \$16,000, from the Virtue mine, were deposited at the bank in Baker City Friday.

Professor Thomas Coudon has gone to Salem to impress upon the legislature that the state should have a board of minersology.

The first number of the Rainier Review has been issued. It is an eight-page patent, edited by W. H. Imus, and the local work is good.

The residence of James Newport, at Hillsboro, was burned Tuesday night. The alarm caused a panic at the opera-house that came near being disastrous.

Fruit men of Marion and Polk counties meet at Salem Saturday to consider matters in connection with operating the Salem cannery the coming season.

A driving association is being organized at Eugene, with the object of improving the county roads and building a macadamized road to Merasis Park.

Landlord Price, at Newberg, would like to know something of the whereabouts of the stranger Stevens, who was in town last week claiming to have the ready cash with which to buy just such a tract of land as he wanted. Just enough to settle his board bill will satisfy him.

Frank Jordan, of Talent, who was shot in the leg by his brother while hunting, has had an operation performed for blood poisoning, and the leg may have to be amputated.

The supreme court has rendered a decision disallowing the offsets of Avery and others against the Job bank, of Corvallis. These offsets were mostly checks that were not recovered.

Last week John Scoles, a native of Ireland and an Oregon pioneer, died at Bay City, Tillamook county. He served in the Cayuse war, in Captain Phil Thompson's Yamhill company.

Two tramps attacked a man on the railroad below Eugene Wednesday night, but he fought until he was free and then sprinted too near the "North Pacific coast record" for them to keep up with him.

Notwithstanding the bill to change the name of one of the Cottage Groves to Lemati has passed one branch of the legislature, the movement to consolidate the two towns is making good progress.

W. W. Masterson, of Cottage Grove, has sued the Southern Pacific for \$5000 for not stopping the train at Henderson station, compelling him to jump off, fracturing his wrist and otherwise injure himself.

Sunday evening at Salem Sheriff Knight was attacked by four persons in the county jail. They struck him with a stick of wood. The plucky sheriff, however, overpowered the four men and locked them safely in their cells.

Editor Johns, of Arlington, gave S. Carlisle a severe "roasting" in his paper for sending an anti-Dolph telegram to Salem, and Carlisle gave Johns an equally severe "basting" on the street, subsequently paying the city recorder for the privilege.

On Friday night of last week the store of A. L. Cornwall at Woodburn was broken into and rifled of two gold watches, 10 gold rings, four gold chains and six charms. Entrance was effected through the back door by taking out a panel and removing the night latch.

A Harrisburg correspondent writes: "We have the earmarks of the depraved vagabond who robbed the graveyard near Harrisburg of its gate lock, and if the theft is not sufficient offense to place him behind the bars public sentiment will place him outside of the notice of all decent people."

Peyton caught a large eagle in a trap on his ranch near Oakland, a few days ago. It weighed 20 pounds and measured 7 feet from tip to tip of its wings. It had been carrying off Mr. Harris' lambs and he was unfortunate in trapping it. The eagle was sent to Morris Abraham, of Roseburg, to be stuffed and mounted.

William N. McCulloch, familiarly known as Grandpa McCulloch died at his home in Ten Mile, Douglas county, Tuesday morning, aged 86 years and 10 months. He was a native of Tennessee and came to Oregon in 1853 from Iowa, raising a family of 11 children, seven of whom survive him and are respected residents of this state.

The schoolhouse in Mabel precinct, about 23 miles northeast of Eugene, was destroyed by fire some time Thursday night. It is supposed the fire caught from a defective flue, or the stove, as the young people that evening had been in the room up to 10 o'clock rehearsing for an entertainment. The loss on the building, school books, etc., will amount probably to \$500 or \$600.

At Echo a law and order committee composed of five citizens has been formed to look after the city's morals. Echo has one saloon which the committee will perhaps not be able to close, but a document has been signed by a number of citizens who pledge themselves not to endorse an application for liquor license for two years, during which time the one saloon will be the only one.
