STATE AND COAST.

Taken From Our Exchanges Throughout the Northwest.

Tillamook claims 4500 people. Salem is building another cannery to handle this season's small fruit.

Ten carloads of lambs, about 2000 head are being shipped from Pendleton to Chicago.

Representative Al Lyle is in Polk county buying cattle for his Crook county ranch.

The Homer carries 460 to 600 tons of Coos bay coal every trip from Marshfield to San Francisco.

Two hundred head of Pine and Eagle valley cattle have been brought into Union to be fed for the Omaha market.

Sherman county has paid up its state taxes for 1895, and is proud that it has yet to be found delinquent for either principal or interest.

Senator Maxwell is quite ill with la grippe at his home in Tillamook county. He has been confined to his bed since his return from Salem.

Corvallis is scandalized by the report which is commonly repeated on the street, that a negro wench has been dancing naked before groups of men and boys.

School Superintendent Newburg, of Jackson county, is laid up, from the effects of stepping on a nail last week. It penetrated his foot and is likely to be followed by serious complications.

Joseph Berry, a pioneer of the Airline neighborhood, recently received \$10,000 from the estate of a Philadelphia relative and has bought 200 acres of land from Sol Stump at \$22 an acre.

Gabe Long, of Bickleton, Gilliam county, had the misfortune to lose his two-year-old child by drowning. The child fell into the well, and life was extinct when the remains were taken out.

At Lafayette a gang of bridge carpenters is covering the railroad bridge across the Yamhill. The railroad company seems to be making substantial and needful improvements along the line.

The Southern Pacific has a pile-driver at work at Newberg driving some 80 feet piles, preparatory to putting in a new 100-foot span across Chehalis creek. Some of the timbers in this span measure 112 feet in length.

Thirty sheep-sheers will be employed at the Cunningham sheep ranch in Umatilla county this season. It is expected the total clip will reach 300,000 pounds. The sheep to be shorn number 20,000, and are in prime condition.

The dog question has begun to bother the Newberg council already, and a new summer ordinance has been passed condemning to death by shooting at the hands of the marshal, all dogs which neglect or refuse to pay their assessments.

An official letter from the office of the supreme master workman of the A. O. U. W., to Moro lodge, No. 64, of that order, requesting assistance for 4600 destitute brethren in Nebraska, met with prompt responses from the brotherhood in Sherman county.

The Washington county grand jury finds the county jail "entirely unfit and inadequate for the needs of this county. We deem it entirely unsafe for the keeping of criminals or prisoners of any kind, and so constructed as to be a veritable man-trap in case of fire."

The Oregon City News says that Victor Keller, the old man whose eye was put out by a stone thrown by some hoodlum as he was riding on a train near Huntington recently, had just finished serving a two years' sentence in the penitentiary for incest. The News heads the paragraph, "Was It Retribution?"

N. H. Sitton, of Echo, is extensively engaged in the stock business, and says that stockmen are encouraged by the advanced price of cattle off the range in June at \$2.05 to Oregon buyers, and this year he has already received an offer to ship to an Eastern market at \$2.25. Prices, he thinks, may even run up to \$2.50.

Persons coming into Baker City from the Virtue mine confirm the report of a rich strike in the Virtue, and say that the gold nuggets taken out ranged in value from \$100 to \$800, with, of course, smaller pieces. Superintendent McNally was in the city Wednesday, and he appeared to be the happiest man in town.

Byron Barnard has bought up all the cattle that he can find for sale around Fossil, and left Wednesday for Prineville, where he is informed 1,000 head can be bought. During the past 10 days he has had men buying for him in Grant and Crook counties, and will probably get 3,000 in all, which he will ship to Montana from Arlington and Heppner.

McKinley Mitchell, of Gervais, has shipped 80 cars of potatoes since the season began, and he estimates that 150 carloads have been sent from Gervais and vicinity both by rail and steamer, as many are delivered on the river bank, six and ten miles distance. These potatoes go to San Francisco, Arizona, Texas and other Eastern points.

Ben Hauxhurst and a Mrs Griffith have been held to answer to the Tillamook grand jury for adultery in \$100 bonds each. The courtroom was crowded during the preliminary examinations, applause being frequent as the case progressed. An application has been made to place the little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Griffith in the care of the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society, of Portland.

D. R. Dale has arrived at Coos Bay and comes prepared to develop the coal property on Isthmus slough in which he is interested. A 300-foot tunnel will be run into the vein at once. A shipment of iron to fully prepare for the work was received a few days ago, and it is fully expected that the owners will be ready to begin shipments of coal in large quantities during the present summer.

Polk county now has almost as many goats as sheep. Out near Willamina, William Savage and son, Buford Stone and Allen Yocom have at least 600; John Stump, west of Monmouth, has in the neighborhood of 200, and many others have bands of from 20 to 75. Goats are just now extra good property, for they will shear from three to five pounds of wool, which brings about 20 cents a pound.

The members of the co-operative saw-mill company met in Coburg last Saturday, and, in a degree perfected an organization. Giles Smith was elected superintendent and R. H. Chaplain, secretary. On account of all members not being present, the board of directors was not elected. A committee was appointed to examine a mill near Yaquina, with a view of purchasing same, and a committee was also appointed to find suitable location.

Governor Lord is in receipt of an acknowledgment, from J. R. Wilson of Utah, of the receipt of a piece of timber presented by the governor of Oregon, as a specimen of this state. It will be used in a table to be presented to the first legislature of the new state. Wilson's table is to be composed of samples of wood contributed by the governors of the states of the Union. The sample furnished by Governor Lord is an oak one, taken from a grand sill of the Mission Bottom flouring mill in Marion county. This was the first flouring mill ever established in Oregon, and the sill from which the sample was taken had lain in the water 55 years. Mr. Wilson is much elated over the prize, and assures the governor that it is second to no specimen yet received.

The Josephine county court has extended the time of closing the assessment rolls until May 1. Out of a total of \$43,049.77, the whole amount of tax, \$9020.81 has so far been collected by the sheriff, leaving a balance due the county of \$34,028.96. This balance is due April 1, and some has been turned in since that time.

The Indians on the Umatilla reserve attribute the heavy wind-storm of Monday to the death of Dr. Jo, the medicine man, who passed away to the happy hunting grounds. Although generally thought to have advanced beyond the stage of superstition, the Indians yet cling to the crude ideas and may easily be inspired with awe when observing some phenomenon of nature. The death of Dr. Jo has caused them to mourn very deeply. To him they attributed great powers and the usual wonderful cures by means of magic. Had Dr. Jo lived through the storm, he would have convinced the Indians that he caused the wind to blow by the aid of the Great Spirit, for he seldom failed to turn the works of nature to account in holding his reputation as a medicine man.
