This about pays for the picking and baling, leaving practically nothing for the grower. There will probably be 500 bales shipped from this vicinity.

The marshal intends to put a stop to the foolish and dangerous habit that some of our visiting country boys have of riding furiously through the streets at night. He is laying for these young men and a costly fine awaits their conviction. There is no excuse for such conduct and it should be severely punished. Other people have a right to the streets besides frolicking boys. Better stop before you are caught.

Albany's endeavor to keep boys from getting into mischief at the late hours of the night, by requiring them to be at home, sets a good example to all towns in the state. Aimless wandering about at night is corrupting to morals of any youth and should be stopped. All boys under eighteen must wear a tag, authorizing their being at large after 8:30 p. m., otherwise they will be placed in jail.

Linn county's exhibit at the Industrial Exposition in Portland is attracting much favorable comment. In addition to the agricultural exhibit, there is a fine display of manufactured products. There is a loom in operation from the Albany Woolen Mills run by Frank Welch; chairs from the Sugar Pine Mill & Fixture Co.'s factory, also from Veal & Sons; hop furnaces by the Albany Iron Works; half a ton of ore from the Santiam mines; the tallest corn; samples of paint from the Solo Mineral Paint Co.'s works; excelsior and Liverine displays from Lebanon, and many other products.
