The surveys in the Cascade mountains, within the limits of the Williamette Valley & Cascade Mountain Wagon Road Company's grant, have all been completed, with the exception of one which has been extended for a year.

The "city star" had George Edward, of New York city, and W. H. Conklin, of Portland, up before Recorder Brown Monday, for peddling without a license. Both plead guilty, Edwards paid his fine, but Conklin, on default of payment was committed to the city jail.

The gentleman referred to last week in regard to the pie, sent word to this office that he will be back the latter part of next week, and if the young ladies intended in his case will then have their pies ready he will be pleased to sample them. He prefers however that the lectures be omitted, as pie, to his taste, is more palatable.

There are six prisoners in the county jail awaiting the action of the grand jury: J. G. Bolin, for selling liquor without a license, Johnson, for getting money on drafts under false pretence, Williams, for stabbing Black near Waterloo; Wagner and Murphy, the two tramps who had the fight with the Albany police, and Mrs. Hannah, for murder.

State Land Agent W. T. Davenport and W. W. Hepburn will go up the Santiam this week to select state land and obtain facts for the recommendation of the opening of the Cascade reserve. A petition will be sent to congress asking for the opening of the reserve, and there is probably not a man in the state but will rush forward with his pen to sign. The closing of the reserve is a great injustice to Oregon.—Ex.

Circuit court meets Monday. Judge Hewitt's department will convene three weeks afterward for trying all equity cases. Judge Burnett will begin the trial of all law cases and criminal matters on Monday at which time the grand jury will be in session. This term will be largely devoted to criminal matters; the most important being the trial of Mr. Isom, of the Red Crown warehouse, and of Mrs. Hannah, for murder.

The assessor of Linn county desires that it be generally known, that next Monday, October 23, and for several succeeding days, during court week, the board of equalization will be in session, at Albany. They will hear all complaints, and will make all proper corrections. Parties who think they have been assessed too high or too low, with too much or too little land, had better go prepared to prove their cause, or ever else hereafter hold their peace.

John R. Stockman, convicted last week in the circuit court at Salem, on a charge of venue from this county, for converting wheat stored in his warehouse in Albany to his own use, was sentenced to one year in the penitentiary, the motion for a new trial and for arrest of judgment being denied. His attorneys will appeal the case, and the bar generally think the supreme court will reverse Judge Burnett. At any rate, a long and hard fight will be made for him. Pending appeal Stockman was released on \$1500 bonds.

Hon. G. M. Irwin delivered an instructive and entertaining address Wednesday evening at the M. E. church on the subject of Education. He reviewed the history of the rise and fall of all great nations of the past, explaining their inherent strength and weakness. He drew an eloquent picture of the Anglo-Saxon race, giving in detail its strong and weak points, but assuring his audience by convincing logic that the English speaking race combines all those qualities that will make it the race that will endure through all ages.

Mrs. Hannah's attorneys will likely enter a plea of insanity in her defence, which will be good if true. Either insanity or the devil prompted the dastardly deed. If she is insane, then her friends have been derelict in their duty, in not putting her into the asylum. If she is guilty and is sane, then she should receive the same punishment that a man would receive for the same crime. There can be no just distinction in such cases.

In the foot races last Saturday afternoon at Albany fair ground track, the first was the seventy-five yard one between Harry Metcalf and Riley Cook, of Brownsville, the former winning by eight inches. It was a pretty race. The second was the fifty yard race between Ellsworth Cameron, of Corvallis, and George Givens, of Silverton, the latter winning. Little interest was taken, as it was said to have been a "chuck" race, and stake-holders of wagers refused to give up the money for that reason. The uncertainty of foot racing is said to have been shown in this contest. Cameron has beaten Time, Trine Ray, Ray Givens, and now Givens defeats Cameron.

Many people, who have known J. Isom for a quarter of a century, and during all that time have known him to be an honest man, will be slow to believe him guilty of fraud. He may be technically and legally guilty of selling wheat that was not his, but only a few will believe that he is really the guilty man. More than likely, Isom, who is an easy going, honest old man, let others manage the business when he should have looked after it himself, but it is not probable that knowingly he defrauded any one. His reputation in this valley is very good and strong proof will be required to convict him. Some one is guilty, but not John Isom. Let the grand jury investigate a little deeper and find the right man.

Aside from the regular routine business of the school board at its first monthly meeting last Friday evening, it voted to purchase new blackboards for Mr. Allingham's room, at the academy; report books for the use of pupils, parents and teachers; to put into the course of study a series of historical readers; and for the use of the school five dozen supplementary readers, the Youths Companion series being selected. Lebanon is fortunate in having a progressive school board who are trying to keep abreast of the times. Such a board always inspires teachers to do their very best at all times and gives the pupils the stimulus of feeling others are interested in their welfare, and so excite in them greater interest in their work.

The school directors met Friday evening, at the office of the clerk. The principal was present and gave a detailed report of the first month's work. The enrollment is 233 and the attendance 194. There was an unusually large number of tardy pupils, and the good of the entire school demands this carelessness of pupils and patrons be corrected. Nothing so thoroughly demoralizes schools as tardy pupils. If pupils persist in being late, they will be dropped from the rolls. The board is using every effort to lessen the expense of books for the pupils. They are making no needless changes and are authorizing the use of only those books that combine the greatest merit and least cost. The board desires that patrons visit the school and take an interest in the work.

We are informed, by a reliable gentleman who was at Mr. Irwin's lecture Wednesday evening, that the behavior of some young men and boys was disgraceful, and no attempt was made to stop this conduct. The officials of the church should at once cause such parties to be put out of doors, and should lay a complaint against them. Parties who desired to listen, could not hear, and the speaker must have been annoyed. Good behavior of all present should be required and the law can be used to punish offenders. No man or boy has a right to interrupt listeners to such exercises. The city authorities would be glad to prosecute the guilty offenders if a complaint should be made. The season is now at hand when the churches are frequently opened, and those who attend may as well understand now that such conduct will not be tolerated. Fine and imprisonment would work like a charm.
