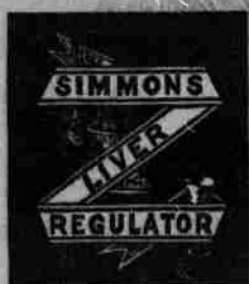

THE JURY'S QUICK WORK

TOOK TWENTY MINUTES

To Bring in a Verdict, and They Decide That Durrant Must Hang By the Neck Until Dead. Satisfaction.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 1.—The swiftness with which the jury in the Theodore Durrant case brought in their verdict is some compensation for the long drawn out trial, and the many incidents connected therewith, which did not redound to the credit of humanity. It took the jury just twenty minutes to decide that Durrant was guilty as charged in the indictment. The quick work was a surprise to every one and will do much to relieve the general odium attaching to the trial.

Bill Nye Rotten-Egged.

NEW YORK, Oct. 31.—For several weeks Bill Nye has been extensively advertised to appear at the First Baptist church in Paterson, New Jersey. His entertainment was the first of a course arranged by the young men's lecture class, and they had worked hard to make the inaugural a success to insure the undertaking.

Nye was to lecture on "Farming Exposed," and was to be assisted by Bert Pool, the Boston cartoonist, and Joe Newman, an electionist. When the time for the lecture arrived, there was not a vacant seat in the church, and many persons standing. They embraced the elite of Paterson's fashionable society. Mr. Nye did not say much about farming and what he did say was received with silent disapproval instead of the expected laughter. After the lecture, as Nye was about to enter his carriage, he was greeted with a product of the farm-eggs. They struck him in the back and exploded. Then another caught him where his hair is not, and a few splattered up against the carriage. Nye hurriedly closed the door and the driver whipped up his horses.

When the train arrived there was a rush at William. Mr. Pool got on the cars safely. Mr. Nye was not so fortunate. Eggs came like a cloudburst. They splattered all over his face and made golden rivulets down his clothes. His hat, pulled tightly down was a study in yellow. As he tried to get on the platform the enemy was ready. It literally dumped antiquated eggs upon the unfortunate William. He was covered from head to toe, and failed to find the joke. There were parting shots after he got in the car, and the downpour did not cease until the door was closed, the whistle blew and Mr. Nye, with enough chromo to start in the scene painting business, went his dripping homeward way.

Murder Charge.

ROSEBURG, Or., Oct. 31.—Ed Dompler, a half-breed Indian, was arrested and lodged in jail late last night, charged with the murder of Isaac Lougher, whose body was found in the debris of a burned barn a few weeks ago on the East Umpqua. The officers are very reticent, and refuse to allow the prisoner to be interviewed. An attempt was made this morning, it is said, to compel the prisoner to confess. He talked freely, but nothing was learned. It is noted as a suspicious circumstance that, while others failed to find Lougher, Dompler, who was at Peet when the news of the fire was brought there, returned at once and discovered the charred remains. There are two theories of the murder. One is that it was caused by trouble over stock; the other, that there is a woman in the case. Lougher was soon to have married girl who Dompler desired to wed.

Burned to Death.

OREGON CITY, Nov. 1.—A 3-year-old son of Martin Riebler was burned to death Wednesday near New Era. He and some other children were out where Mr. Riebler was clearing land. The child's clothes caught fire from a burning brush pile, and though the father was promptly notified, he could not extinguish the fire until the child was fatally and his own hands badly burned.

A Millionaire's Son.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., Oct. 31.—In a cheap pine box, less than two feet under ground, in the body of a young man in the cemetery at Weston. The body was identified as that of Harry Huguely, the only son of Millionaire H. W. Huguely, a wholesale liquor-dealer of Boston. He was killed Sunday night at Newmarket, south of St. Joseph, by Dr. James Hall, who was awakened by burglars, and who discharged the contents of a gun at one of them. The man dropped dead in his tracks, but two pals escaped. No one came to claim the body, and it was buried at Weston in the potter's field.

A Kansas City detective, seeing a description of the body, had the grave opened and he is confident that the dead man is young Huguely, whom he recently saw in St. Louis, and was known by the officer in 1892, when convicted of forgery at Dallas, Texas. Young Huguely was disowned by his father, but the latter sent him occasional remittances.

The jury in the case of the state vs C L Reed, charged with the unlawful sale of spirituous liquor, returned a verdict of not guilty.

In the case of A. Blaker, held for unlawful removal of wheat from the Shedd warehouse, the jury returned "not a true bill."

A second case against C L Reed for the unlawful sale of malt liquors was dismissed on motion of the prosecuting attorney.

Oregon vs J G Boulin, selling liquor without license. Sentenced to pay a fine of \$250 and stand committed at one day for \$2 until paid.

State of Oregon vs C L Reed, giving spirituous liquor to a minor. Plead guilty and was fined \$50.

Not a true bill was found in the case of A. Blaker, held for the grand jury on account of a shortage in the Shedd warehouse.

In the matter of assignment of Louis Viereck. Final account allowed and assigned discharged.

Nettie I Weaver vs Joshua P Hahn. Plaintiff takes non suit.

We find the vault connected with the clerk's and recorder's offices insufficient to hold the records of the county and that there is considerable extra wear on the books of record for the want of room. We would respectfully recommend that the county court take steps to increase the capacity of the vaults. We further recommend that the closets in the jail be removed and substitute a tank closet, also that the closet at the court house be removed and a through system be substituted.

We have visited the county jail and find the prisoners well attended.

We would ask to be discharged from further attendance upon court.

Wheat Should Be Higher.

Wheat is selling in this state for four cents less than the Liverpool parity. That is to say, the price paid the farmers of eastern Washington, plus the freight rates to Puget Sound, plus a reasonable charge for commission and other expenses, is four cents less than the price paid for the grain in Liverpool.

In other words, the wheat growers of this section are paid four cents per bushel less for their crop than they ought to be getting.

The proof of this statement lies in the market quotations of Portland and San Francisco. At San Francisco on Saturday No. 1 shipping wheat was quoted at 83 cents per cental, or 56 cents per bushel. On the same date eastern Washington wheat was quoted in the Portland market at 48 cents per bushel, a difference of 7 cents per bushel.

But the California wheat brings two cents per bushel more in Liverpool than is brought by the Washington wheat. Allowance for this difference in the price therefore reduces the difference between the Portland and San Francisco markets to 5 cents.

Charters are higher, too, on the northwest coast at San Francisco. Well-informed grain dealers say a fair average of this difference is 2 1/2 shillings per ton, or less than 1 1/2 cents per bushel. This, as a matter of fact, is the present difference between the charters at San Francisco and Puget Sound.

After an allowance is made for difference in charters, there still remains four cents per bushel. In other words, the shipper in this state and Oregon is making four cents per bushel more than is being made by the California shipper.

In those times, when the cost of production is close to the upshot price of wheat in the open market, this loss of four cents per bushel becomes an alarming leakage. If the farmers of this section could have their four cents—if they could obtain that which the California dealers concede to the California growers—it would go a long way towards lightening their burdens. Then, in addition to this four cents per bushel, if they could secure a reasonable reduction in freight rates another four cents would be added to the credit side of their ledger, or a total of eight cents per bushel.

This is the difference between success and failure, between profit and loss, between holding the farm and losing it under foreclosure. In an export crop of 10,000,000 bushels it means \$800,000.

In the face of these facts, who can doubt that the farmers of eastern Washington have a grievance?—Spokane Review.

Male vs. Female Teachers.

In the New England states, where girls are credited with receiving the most extensive education, the man teacher is being rapidly supplanted. In Massachusetts only nine and a half per cent of the teachers are men. In New Hampshire the men number nine and seven tenths per cent, and in Maine, sixteen per cent. In the South, where the whole system of education was reconstructed after the war, the proportion of men is much larger. Arkansas leading with sixty-eight per cent, while North Carolina has fifty-six and eight tenths per cent, West Virginia sixty-one and eight tenths per cent and Texas fifty-eight per cent. Illinois shows only twenty-eight and seven tenths per cent of men teachers, while men teachers in Michigan are but twenty-one and five tenths per cent, in Minnesota twenty-two and six tenths per cent, in Iowa nineteen per cent, and in California twenty-one per cent of the whole number. Indiana and Kansas seem to favor men teachers, the proportion being about fifty-one per cent in each case. It is a fact worth noting, also, that not only is the woman teacher in the majority at present, but she is constantly enlarging her supremacy. A comparison of the census of 1850 with that of 1890 shows that the number of men teachers in the country decreased about seventy per cent in the last forty years.

In Fourteen States.

The Middle West and South experienced an earthquake last Thursday which was perceptibly felt in fourteen states, so far as heard from. It extended from Michigan through Illinois, Indiana and Ohio into Kentucky, and from Nebraska and Kansas through Iowa and Missouri. From Kentucky the shock went south through Tennessee, Georgia, Alabama and Mississippi into Louisiana. The sections most severely shaken were about Charleston, Missouri, and Gadsden, Alabama. Near the former place the earth was broken in many places and from the fissures water and sand gushed forth. Near Gadsden several houses were wrecked and the occupants injured.
