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STATE AND COAST.

A steamship has been purchased for the waterworks at Forest Grove.

The Oregon State Dairy Association will hold a meeting at Hillsboro, April 24 and 25.

A steam ferry is to be established across Young's river, from Dagget's Point to One's Astoria.

W. E. Bowdoin will soon start the Klamath Republican at Klamath Falls and Captain O. C. Applegate will be its editor.

George Ray trapped a bear on Kentucky slough, in Coos county, last week, and Tobin Cox captured a cub near the same place.

Joseph J. Miller, of Montana, is in Sherman county buying 2-year-old steers. He is paying \$10 for good yearlings and \$15 for good 2-year-olds.

A number of valuable dogs have been poisoned in The Dalles recently, and the owners are after the poisoner, who has thus far escaped punishment.

The semi-annual statement of the financial condition of Linn county on April 1, shows resources amounting to \$121,863.50, and liabilities of \$44,080.74.

Last Saturday Mrs. Kate Morrison, who lived with her husband near Seilo, died very suddenly. She had been troubled with neuralgia and rheumatism for several years.

Mr. Charles N. Crittenton, the millionaire evangelist and founder of the Florence Crittenton homes for fallen women, arrived in Baker City Thursday and has begun a series of meetings.

Postmaster at Hillsboro was entered Wednesday at 10:30 and the change that happened to be in the drawer, amounting to about \$4, was taken. A silver watch was taken at the same time.

The will of the late Edie J. McDonald, of McMinnville, contemplates an equal division of the estate between Robert McDonald and W. D. McDonald. The estate will probably amount to \$30,000.

County Clerk Jacobs, of Jackson county, claims to have found a short-appearing in the reports of ex-Treasurer Moore of \$106.43. The clerk has been instructed to notify Moore to reimburse the county.

Devoe, the Norman stallion, owned by Huston Bros. for about 12 years, died several days ago at Plainview, after a trip of several miles. He was one of the most prominent horses in the county.

The well known trotter, Dick Flaherty, owned by Mr. Eugene Latoré, died at the fair grounds near Albany a few days ago. Dick had a record of 2:39 and \$2,500 was once offered for him.

R. C. Kiger, of Corvallis, says that his expected crop of peaches for this year has gone democratic. His trees were in bloom when the late freeze came, and of 5,000 expected, only a few bushels will be gathered.

The Indians on the Umatilla reservation held a week over Patawa and Big Dick for three days, and had a big feast. The horses and personal effects of the dead had been divided up according to the customs.

Mr. Perard, a sheep raiser, is preparing to drive his sheep to the Cascades. The animals have been shorn and the wool sold for 8 cents a pound. The clip realized six tons from 1600, an average of eight pounds to the fleece.

There is a move on foot among the wheelmen of Medford and Jacksonville to again organize either in both places or join forces, and see what can be done regarding the establishment of a bicycle track between Medford and Jacksonville.

J. Cresswell, a young son of Press Cresswell, of Heppner, recently swallowed, in a joking way, a lot of camphor, and not long after went into violent convulsions. It required the services of a physician to pull him through alive.

The Goldendale Telephone Company has submitted, through The Dalles Commercial Club, a proposition to the people of The Dalles to build a telephone line from Goldendale to The Dalles, to be connected with the Goldendale-Seufert system.

Last Friday evening Mrs. Lee Hendle, of Corvallis, came near bleeding to death. A blood vessel just under the eye was ruptured, and blood gushed from her nose. A doctor was summoned and experienced some trouble in stopping the flow of blood.

Abner H. Houser, of Umatilla, has paid

into the county treasury \$21,000, the amount collect of the 1895 taxes. Treasurer Kern sent \$15,000 of this amount to the state treasurer and the balance will be apportioned to school districts and cities in Umatilla county.

E. J. McGlashan, of Eugene, has received orders for about 300 Chinese pheasants more than he can supply. The birds are desired for propagating in sections where they have not yet been introduced. Some of the orders are from Texas, Pennsylvania and Virginia.

The apparatus for operating the gates at the locks is now all placed and a successful trial was made Thursday. By attaching cables to the hydraulic machine, the big gates were opened and closed with apparently little effort. No water has as yet been turned into the canal.

The case of the state vs W. B. Haines, a schoolteacher of Philomath, Benton county, for assault and battery, came up for a hearing at Philomath last Monday. It appears that the teacher had occasion to chastise a child, and his father brought suit. Mr. Haines was cleared, after a legal skirmish that lasted during the afternoon and evening until midnight.

A dapper young man, who gave his name as Smith, was detected in robbing the sluice boxes of H. A. Corliss at Dry Diggings, in Josephine county last week, and Saturday Constable Randle arrested him, but he got away after being handcuffed, proving too fleet of foot for the constable.

The Condon Globe has been informed of several cases of cruelty to animals that happened recently along the John Day river, opposite Sherman county. A coyote that was skinned alive and turned loose was seen down there last week, also several coyotes with their ears and sculp taken off.

A 3-year-old daughter of Mr. Jones, who lives near Goble, was so badly burned last week that it is thought there is no chance of saving the child's life. She was playing around a fire in the yard and her dress caught. Before the fire could be put out the child was badly burned about the thighs and over the stomach.

E. J. Fraser, of Eugene, closed a land deal with F. M. Smith, of Los Angeles, Cal., for the Osburn stock and dairy farm, consisting of 2,000 acres, four and a half miles south of Eugene. The trade includes 100 cows besides all other live stock on the place together with farm implements and machinery for a consideration of \$34,000.

At the annual city election in Brownsville Monday, Joseph Blakely defeated F. M. Powell, the present marshal, by one vote; J. H. Glass defeated B. S. Martin for recorder; C. E. Stanard was elected treasurer without opposition and H. A. Stanard, C. H. McFarland and E. P. Roby were elected councilmen. Mayor Elmore, who is giving general satisfaction, holds over until next year.

The lecture platform seems to be drawing largely from the pulpit. The Corvallis Times says that Frank Abram Powell, who has occupied the pulpit of the Christian church in Corvallis for the past three years, and who took an active part in all matters pertaining to A. P. A.ism, has severed his connection with the church there for a time and will take the field as a lecturer. His first lectures will be delivered at Vancouver, Wash. After finishing his series there he has other engagements which will take all his time until the close of the season.

A Narrow Escape.

The Harrisburg Review says: Mrs. Maxwell and daughter, Rena, and Miss Laura Waud went to Millslough Thursday to gather flowers, the little girl taking tacks to fish. Rena went out on the logs to fish, when one rolled and she fell in. Her mother rushed to her help and how she reached her she does not know, as the log drifted away from the others. The little girl went down twice and the third time she held up her hand saying, "good bye mamma," but Mrs. Maxwell caught her by the hand and pulled her on the log. They both slipped off. The mother caught hold of the end of the log and told Miss Waud to run for the men. Jack Bucknum and Luther Davison reached them first, and they brought the thoroughly exhausted pair to the shore in safety. The husband and father says, "In those few moments coming down the slough, not knowing where to look or in what condition I would find them, if at all, I died it seemed to me, a thousand deaths." It was indeed a close call, and they are to be congratulated in getting off as luckily as they did.

JUDGE BEAN RENOMINATED.

The Platform the Same as the Republican National Platform in 1892.

PORTLAND, April 9.—The following nominations were made for presidential electors: John F. Caples, Multnomah; S. M. Yoran, Lane; E. L. Smith, Wasco; T. T. Geer, Marion. Judge Bean was renominated for supreme judge by acclamation. The Simon and anti-Simon delegates of Multnomah county compromised and A. F. Sears, a Simon man, was nominated for circuit judge. C. F. Lord and D. P. Thompson, anti-Simon, for district attorney and member of board of equalization respectively. Sol Hirsch was chosen chairman of the state central committee, which places the control of the state committee in the hands of the anti-Simon men.

The platform adopted on the money question was exactly like the national republican platform of 1892. A resolution declaring against free coinage of silver was voted down by a small majority.

DISTRICT NOMINATIONS.

The following district nominations were made:

Eighth judicial district—Robert Eakin, for circuit judge; J. W. Knowles for district attorney; W. T. Wright for member of board of equalization.

Union and Wallawa counties—F. D. McCully for joint senator.

Umatilla and Union counties—T. O. Taylor, of Umatilla, for joint senator.

In the third judicial district John A. Carson, of Salem, was nominated for district attorney, and in the second district W. E. Yates, of Corvallis, was nominated for district attorney, and Robert Walker, of Coos, for member of board of equalization.

The delegates from the seventh judicial district made the following nominations: Circuit judge, S. A. Lovell; district attorney, H. J. Bean.

Heirs to Millions.

Roseburg has a couple of heirs to millions of dollars, according to the Plaindealer, which says: From New York comes the startling news that the heart of that city is owned by the heirs of Anneke Jaas, valued at \$750,000,000. The lineal descendants are now numerous, and are making concerted action to recover this immense property in America's metropolis. Our townsman, Stephen Stants, is one of these heirs and has already received five letters from relatives of New York and elsewhere calling his attention to the good fortune that awaits him in common with the other heirs of the Anneke Jaas estate, New York. Mrs. J. R. Kennedy of this city is one of the 400 heirs of the Anneke Jaas estate in the heart of New York. This estate has been in litigation since 1857, and late developments indicate a probability of the heirs succeeding. It is to be hoped the heirs may prove their rights to this princely estate. Mrs. Eldredge of Lebanon, is one of the numerous heirs to this magnificent fortune.

A Little Hero.

Sunday, while the two boys of Dr. DuGas were playing near Deer creek, in Douglas county, they started to cross the stream on a plank. The youngest, Bertie, 5 years old, fell into the stream, but his older brother, Leon, 7 years old, seized the younger by the suspenders and held him up till Mrs. R. M. Conckling, who lived near by, ran to his relief and by wading into the water nearly waist-deep, brought Bertie safe to the shore and thus saved him from drowning. It was a rather cold bath for Mrs. Conckling, but she did not hesitate a moment when life depended on her prompt action, though at great risk of her health and possibly her own life. Little Leon exhibited a heroism that commands him to the admiration of all.

Demurrer Overruled.

The demurrer in the case of the state of Oregon vs Stonewall Sutherland, an indictment for aiding a felon, by assisting Samuel G. Brown to escape, was overruled by Judge Fullerton, Tuesday. The case will then come on for hearing next term. When this case comes up for hearing, we may anticipate some startling developments regarding this conspiracy to help Brown, says the Roseburg Plaindealer. It is hoped that for the good name of Douglas county this matter will be proved to the bottom. Judge Fullerton has doubtless well considered this matter and wisely decided to have a thorough investigation of this plot to thwart justice by a plain violation of the law in such cases provided.

TWO KILLED IN A DAY.

A Brakeman and a Boy Killed in Seattle.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 11.—Rudolph Bloomquist, an 11-year-old boy, the son of an artist of this city, was run over by an electric street car this morning and instantly killed. The lad was stealing a ride on a baker's wagon and when driven off by the driver, jumped to escape the lash and landed under the forward wheels of a car passing in an opposite direction. The car ran over the body, crushing it badly, and the wheels cut off both legs above the knees.

John C. Roberts, a brakeman on the Great Northern work train, was killed here this evening while trying to cut off a car from the main train. He did not understand the automatic coupler, for he pulled the lever on the "out-off car," held on and was jerked head first to the ground. The wheels of the car on which he had been standing passed over his chest.

OREGON STONE.

It Will Be Used in the Construction of a San Francisco Building.

SALEM, Or., April 10.—George W. Davis, of the Pioneer Stone Company, is in receipt of a telegram announcing that the stone of the Oregon Pioneer quarry, on Yaquina bay, has been selected to be used in the construction of the San Francisco Call building. Besides the Call building, Oregon has furnished the stone for the ferry depot and the handsome Parrott building, in San Francisco.
