Directors Elect A New Cashier At Bank

Vawter Crawford Accepts Position And Will Make His Home In Ione As Soon As His Affairs Are Arranged

HEPPNER LOSES, IONE GAINS

Vawter Crawford editor of the Gazette-Times of Heppner was elected by the Board of Directors of the Bank of Ione to the position of Cashier, he has been acting in that capacity ever since the death of Clyde Brock, former cashier who committed suicide a week ago. Mr. Crawford will at once arrange his affairs at Heppner to allow him to bring his family here and make his home at Ione. His various interests will be disposed of except the ownership of the Gazette-Times which will be given over into the hands of his two sons Arthur and Spencer, who at the present time have active management of the business. Mr. Crawford has been a resident of Morrow County for twenty six and a half years and has held many positions of trust at the hands of the people. He was County Clerk for eight years of that time. During the years he has been here he has held the confidence of all who knew him. He is no stranger to Ione. His banking experience covers six and a half years with the Bank of Heppner prior to his taking over the Gazette-Times. This gives Ione one of the best trustworthy men that it was possible to take from Heppner, what is her loss is our gain. The Journal wishes the new cashier success and his many friends will rejoice over the wise selection of the Bank Directors.

Ione High Wins First Game Of Season

Lexington High Plays At Heppner Next Saturday 16th Ione Team Shows Class Under The New Management

ROAD MEETING FRIDAY 22nd

Ione won the first game of the series at Lexington 39 to 12 last Saturday on the Lexington field. About 30 went from Ione in a hayrack and several autos went up to attend the game. Hopkins of Ione was head line man, Rood of Lexington acted as Referee and Crawford of Heppner was umpire. By rushing Lexington of their feet in the first quarter Ione High succeeded in piling up a big score against Lexington High. Ione scored three touchdowns in the first quarter. They made another touchdown in the second quarter and one in the fourth quarter. Ione only succeeded in kicking goal after 3 other touchdowns. They also scored a goal from placement in the third and fourth quarters. In the third quarter the Lexington boys braced up and backed the Ione boys off the field for two touchdowns, both kicks failed. The game for the most part was a clean one. Ione used open tactics while Lexington used the old style, line bunching plays. The Lexington boys will play the Heppner team next Saturday.

J. T. Knappenberg, Ione, Oregon, Dear Sir:

A good road meeting was held at Lexington, Oregon in April of this year for the purpose of grading the road from Ione, Oregon to Heppner, Oregon. The sense of this meeting was that it was to late to do this work in April and May. But all were in favor of building said road on a grade beginning not later than November the first. It was the sense of this same meeting that we hold a good roads meeting in Ione in September for the sole purpose of building a road from Morrow County line to Heppner. The Morrow County Fair did interfere with the September meeting. Hence we have taken the matter up with our County Court to set a date for this very important meeting and they and we have mutually agreed on October 22nd at 1 p. m. at your city. It appears to us at this time that the only way for us to secure such a road is to levy a special road tax of 5 mills on the following districts, Heppner, Lexington, Ione and Cecil this would insure the building at once. We would appreciate very much if you would assist us in arranging as well as advertising this good roads meeting.

There is very little doubt that the wasted time and loss due to breakage of hauling gear in the past ten years has been large enough to pay the cost of a hard surface road from Ione to the county line. This may sound a little high but figure it out for your self.
