## Efficiency or Votes

Every time an election draws near a horde of candidates spring up for the various offices within the gift of the people. Some of these are mentally and morally competent, while others are totally unfit. Under our accepted theory of self government we are presumed to select men with especial regard to their qualifications, their integrity, and their all round fitness for the particular office in view. That though is only theory. In practice we seldom do anything of the kind.

In theory the people are supposed to make their own selections, without bias or coercion. But they don't. In practice the bosses, politely termed leaders, assemble in secret and make their own selections and then proceed to ram them down the throats of the people who do the voting. In making those selections behind closed doors the bosses (beg pardon, the "leaders") give but little heed to the mere matter of fitness or qualification. The one predominating thought in their minds is, "will he be amenable to our advice and suggestions?" The next and only remaining problem is that of delivering the votes. In all of these proceedings the people are not consulted, although they perform most foot the bills. The only privilege accorded these "sovereign people" is to vote and vote as they are told (beg pardon again, as they are "advised"). The man who is good to the bosses (shucks, we mean "leaders") can keep right on holding public office as long as he continues to be good to his masters, unless in the meantime the people become so disgusted they literally kick him out. And why is it so? Very simple, Mr. Voter, very simple indeed. Have held their secret conclave and selected their puppet (beg pardon, we mean "man") the bosses sally forth with angel faces and sing the praises of their Fido. They endow him with all of the graces of the human race, bestow upon him the wisdom of Solomon, and advertise him far and wide as "the hope of the people." And because we (the people) are not bosses (ahem! leaders); because we talk little and think less; because we follow the "advice" of the bosses instead of investigating men and conditions ourselves—because of all these things we elect the tools of the bosses today and curse our system of government tomorrow. Bosses are not confined to national and state politics. They flourish in every district, in every county, in every township, and in every city and village. Bosses are everywhere, scheming, wire pulling, enticing, dictating, forcing their will upon a people whose will alone should be supreme. Bosses do not like to be called bosses. They prefer to pose as loyal party leaders, whose "duty" it is to guide "the people" in the way they should go. And the way of the bosses is so subtle that the people do not realize that they are being led around by the nose, that they are being herded like sheep, that they are obeying the will of the bosses at every election. It is a difficult matter for any man to secure even the humblest of public offices without first securing the approval of the bosses, and that approval renders him unfit to loyally serve the people as a whole. We would like to see a different system in vogue, and we would like to see it make the start right in this local community. We would like to see the names of every man who seeks office posted where the people can see it. Then we would like to see every voter make his own decision without a single suggestion or a word of advice from any other person. Then we might hope to find men filling public offices because of efficiency, whereas now it is mainly a question of bosses and votes.

We are frank to admit that occasionally a good man slips into office even under this system. In fact, we have such men in office right in our midst, and we may have such again. But we insist that the people should be free to make their own selections without persuasion or interference from the bosses, for it is our opinion that but few men can be loyal to the people as a people and yet be satisfactory to the bosses. Some of these days the people will awake to a realization of their political power and the bosses will cease to exist. They will be just voters, as the rest of us have been for these many years. Speed the day and push it along!

**Ten Million Dollars For Roads.**  
John N. Carlisle, head of New York's highway department, opens his annual report, which was recently presented to the New York legislature, with a demand that the legislature shall appropriate at once for good road purposes \$10,000,000 of the second bond issue of \$50,000,000, approved by the voters in 1912.

An appropriation of \$1,000,000, of which \$250,000 should be made available this year for the elimination of grade crossings on the improved highways, is urged in the report. Commissioner Carlisle asserts that a new mark in highway construction in New York state was made last year when contracts were let for the construction of 1,167 miles, involving an expenditure of \$19,947,417. The report shows that there are now completed or under contract 6,315 miles of highways and there remain to be constructed 5,671 miles of state and county roads included in the system authorized by the good roads act.

### SHRINKAGE OF CATTLE.

Animals Lose 3 to 6 Per Cent in Going to Market.

After weighing 19,000 cattle in 205 shipments, government experts have concluded that the normal shrinkage of cattle in shipment is from 3 to 6 per cent. There are no exceptions to this rule, and no one can say beforehand just how much cattle will shrink in going to the market. It depends on the treatment of the cattle, the length of time they are held without feed or water, the nature of their feed before loading, the character of the trip to market, the distance shipped and the time of arrival.

The shrinkage of the first twenty-four hours is greater than for any subsequent twenty-four hours. Steers generally shrink a little less than cows of the same weight. Fed cattle and range cattle shrink about equally. There is no way to prevent shrinkage, but careful handling and good feeding will keep it within reasonable bounds.

One of the chief causes of heavy shrinkage is a too severe drive to the loading pen, especially during the hot weather.
