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### THE BUFF ORPINGTON DUCK.

The Buff Orpington quack has arrived from England and has made a safe hit. The reason is, it produces the goods. In a number of foreign egg competitions it won the grand prize, and when one studies its composition he wonders not that it is winning its way as a layer and payer.

This duck was originated sixteen years ago by the famous William Cook, originator of all the Orpington chickens, at Orpington, England.

As foundation blood he took Indian Runners, Aylesburys, Rouens and Cayugas, whose laying capacity had been tested and proved prolific, and from this combination of blood he selected

the best, and after a number of years brought them to the perfection they now possess under the name Buff Orpington.

This duck in color is a rich shade of fawn buff throughout, the male's head and neck being light seal.

It is the largest, best laying duck, in size equalling the Pekin, which in adult standard drake reaches nine pounds and in duck eight.

Its eggs are large and white, forty ounces to the dozen.

It is easy to raise, matures fast, is ready for market at eight to ten weeks and it is of excellent flesh.

One after the other new breeds of poultry are having their debut, some

efficiency and safety and heat a good return for the money.

Don't be talked into buying what you don't need and don't buy an article just because a neighbor has purchased the same.

Don't order fowls from a distance until you have searched your neighborhood for stock. You may find better at a lower price right near, or an inquiry ad. in your paper will find them for you.

Don't fail to test the clucks as well as the incubator eggs and don't expect early eggs to be as fertile as those in the natural laying season.

Don't waste time worrying about the high price of living. Time is cash, so don't be rash.

### ORIGIN OF A PHRASE.

Greeley Was Not the First to Say, "Go West, Young Man."

Who said, "Go west, young man?" The phrase has often been credited to Horace Greeley, but he was not the first to use it and once denied that he said it. It was written by John B. L. Soule, a brilliant young man who edited the Terre Haute Express in 1851-3. Richard W. Thompson of Terre Haute advised him to go west and grow up with the country, adding: "Why, John, you could write an article that would be attributed to Horace Greeley if you tried."

Soule modestly doubted it, but Thompson insisted, and Soule promised to try. The result was an article in the Express on the opportunities offered to young men by the west, which began by saying that Horace Greeley could never have given better advice than that contained in the words "Go west, young man." It was a supposititious quotation from Greeley, but the article was copied, and pretty soon the supposititious phrase was attributed to Greeley himself.

After it had received wide circulation the New York Tribune came out with a reprint of the Express article, accompanied by a footnote by Mr. Greeley saying that he was not the author of the expression, but he fully endorsed it and joined in saying, "Go west, young man; go west."—Indianapolis News.

A very interesting experiment in the construction of a small garden city is offered by the industrial community of Torrance, Cal., says the Christian Herald. It has been the aim at Torrance to avoid everything which is ugly in plans, buildings or living conditions. The houses are extremely modest, being designed for working men and yet "throughout an art" effect has been obtained.

The town has been planned taking into consideration the prevailing winds, the contour of the land and the most direct route from home to factory. A broad avenue separates the residential from the industrial district. Every kind of business is classified and located accordingly. It has been found an excellent idea to lay all sewer, water and gas pipes in alleys and the lighting conduits back of the curb line, so that the streets need never be torn up. The churches, educational and civic buildings are grouped about a civic center. The streets are planned with a wealth of foliage. In the entire community there is not a single eyesore.
