## Budget for the City of Heppner for 1915

Heppner, Oregon, November 12, 1914.

TO THE HONORABLE MAYOR, AND MEMBERS OF THE COUNCIL, OF THE CITY OF HEPPNER.

Gentlemen: We your committee, appointed to prepare Budget of expense, for the City of Heppner, for the year 1915, respectfully submit the following itemized estimates:

2 Regular Marshal's salary	900.00
3 Extra Marshal and Police	500.00
4 Recorder's salary	420.00
5 Treasurer's salary	100.00
6 Fire Chief's salary	120.00

10 Incidentals	490.00
11 Bridges, Streets and Public Property	5600.00
<b>TOTAL</b>	<b>\$10,600.00</b>

### WE RECOMMEND:

That a five mill Tax be levied on all Taxable property in the city of Heppner, to cover the general expenses; And further, that all moneys received from Saloon Licenses, be it more or less than the \$5600.00 now received, be set aside for the building of Bridges, the improvement and maintenance of Streets and other public property of the City of Heppner. Further, that all moneys now in the hands of the City Treasurer and all moneys that may be derived from fines and additional license, be considered as reserve for the purpose of oiling streets, and defraying the general expenses of the City of Heppner, until January 1915, and the period intervening between the first day of January 1916 and the time when the taxes will be forthcoming, for which time the City will be without apparent funds.

## INDUSTRIAL REVIEW OF OREGON

Salem, Ore., Nov. 23. Out of a total area of 61,186,480 acres of land in Oregon, 36,216,317 acres are under federal control. The forfeiture of the O. & C. Land grant will add 2,074,161 acres that will be drawn from taxation.

A campaign has been started at Portland to consolidate and wipe out boards and commissions and reduce state expenses half a million.

Lebanon votes Dec. 7, on establishing an electric light plant.

A plant on the McKenzie is producing 250 gallons turpentine and 6,000 pounds rosin per month.

The C. & E. R. Co., has won its suit in the U. S. Supreme Court for possession of tide lands.

Linn County manufactures road drags at \$7 each.

J. H. Gray of Prineville becomes owner of the Oregon Hotel at Hood River.

Astoria mud flats are to be filled in by the dredge of Columbia.

The North Bend Manufacturing Co., has orders for doors from England.

Robert S. Towne, owner of the Blue Ledge Mine, Jackson County, will develop the property and build a railroad to connect with the Bullis line.

The new creamery at Hood River opens with F. W. Bluhm manager.

The Fisher-Boutin mill at Springfield is filling its ponds with logs.

The sawmill at Loon Lake, Coos county, is running.

The Municipal railroad insures building two new sawmills near Grants Pass.

The S. P. Co., is reported to have bought the line down the coast to Eureka.

The State Press Association is leading in a fight to cut down running expenses of Oregon half a million.

The State Reform School with 88 boys, Nov. 1st, cost \$73,450 for the biennial period or \$835 per capita.

The S. P. yards at Brownsville are being filled with building materials for construction work.

Zopf Bros., of Lebanon will erect a \$22,475 High School at Athena.

D. W. Campbell as manager of the Northern division of the S. P. Co., has been given charge of the Coos Bay and Eastern.

The Estabrook Co., of North Bend and Bandon is getting out 70,000 ties per month.

Warrenton is taking steps to build a first-class high school.

Willamette Iron & Steel works have put a large force to work repairing the Santa Catalina, a burnt steamer.

The Portland Gas and Coke Co., will lay its mains around Milwaukie on account of an ordinance cutting the price of their gas to \$1.00 per 1000 feet.

The combination of State Grange, Central Labor Council and People's Power League, that originated many of the most radical initiative measures finds them all defeated.

Owing to increased needs of the docks commission and enactment of State Wide Prohibition, Portland taxes cannot be reduced for the fiscal year beginning July, 1915. As a result of defeating freak laws and radical labor laws better financial conditions prevail. The Interstate bridge bonds sold at a premium, with several bidders.

New York capitalists have taken hold of an irrigation project in Baker County.

The Troy Laundry will erect a \$10,000 dry cleaning plant at Astoria.

Coos Bay sent nearly six million feet of lumber to the San Francisco market the last weeks of October.

Flavel offers free factory Sites.

The press rejoices over the defeat of freak and crank measures.

Astoria will vote on a \$25,000 bond issue for parks.

The St. Helens Shipbuilding Co., has two new contracts.

St. Helens firemen will build an Athletic club.

W. Grimes will erect a \$20,000 brick at Marshfield.

Junction people celebrated the second year of the success of their local creamery.

Stolen Papers are Found

East Oregonian—A note for \$1000, postoffice orders for \$150, naturalization papers and other valuable papers, which were stolen along with a suitcase and two suits of clothing from a local lodging house about a week ago, were found under the O.-W. R. & N. bridge just this side of the state hospital. They were the property of John Doherty of Heppner. Mr. Doherty reported the theft to the police at the time but no trace of the plunder was found until H. R. Longcox, a transient laborer, brought the papers to the local postoffice this morning and turned them over. He had found them he stated, but no trace of the clothing was found.
