Another herder was leading his horse, he reports, when a coyote sneaked up close behind the horse. The herder killed it with a club. Both coyotes were frothing at the mouth. Mr. Wigglesworth writes. He states he has seen a good many of the animals and that they are unusually bold.—East Oregonian.

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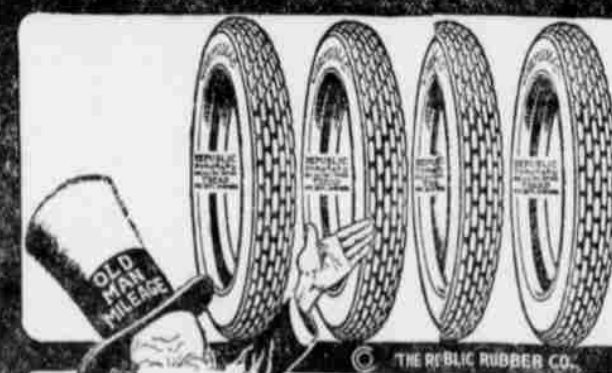
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
