Phill Cohn Prizes Awarded

Phil Cohn, head of the Heppner Warehouse, has received a letter from the Gerlach-Barklow Co. of Joilet, announcing the prize winners in the "Missing Title" calendar contest in which prizes were offered for the best title suggested for the painting reproduced on the calendar used last year by Mr. Cohn. Two prizes, a barrel each of White River and Celilo flour, were offered by Mr. Cohn for the first and second best suggestions. The awards were made by a special committee selected by the Gerlach-Barklow Co., the first prize, "Friends of the Meadow," being awarded to K. J. Lexington to Have New Bank

At a Special Stockholder's Meeting held last Saturday, it was voted by the stockholders of the Heppner Loan & Savings Bank to change its place of business to Lexington, and to change the name of the bank to Lexington State Bank. Supplemental Articles of Incorporation are being filed this week, and as soon as approved by the Banking Department the change will be made.

It is proposed to have a local Board of Directors and officers composed of Lexington business men and farmers, and to increase the capital to \$20,000 or \$25,000. W. O. Hill, who has been cashier of the Heppner Loan & Savings Bank since its organization, will be cashier of the new bank.

FOR SALE 320 Acre Wheat Ranch
