Circuit Court in Session

A special session of circuit court was held last Saturday evening at which time the report of the Grand Jury was heard and that body dismissed. But two true bills were returned on being that of Frank Elliott, of Lena, who was charged with assault with a dangerous weapon with intent to kill, the other being against John McCollough who was charged with failing to use his best efforts to put out a forest fire.

Court convened Monday morning in regular session when Frank Elliott entered a plea of not guilty.

The case of McCollough was called and Sam E. Van Vactor, attorney for the defendant, filed a demurrer to the complaint the same being sustained by the court.

A new grand jury was drawn Monday morning to serve during the present term of court, consisting of the following gentlemen: J. M. Luper, Ray Ashbaugh, C. R. Pointer, W. H. Turner, Pearl Shanhart, W. A. Walpole, John Hughes, W. A. Walpole was appointed foreman by the court. This body will hold until the May term in readiness to inquire into such criminal matters as may arise before the opening of the next term of court.

After the first indictment in the McCollough case had been disposed of the case was taken before the new grand jury and after an extended inquiry by that body, a not true bill was returned to the court.

Monday evening Frank Elliott changed his plea of not guilty to guilty and he was given an indeterminate sentence of from six months to ten years in the penitentiary. A petition for parole is being considered by the court.

The following, in brief, is the disposition of the civil and equity cases on the calendar:

Many of the cases appearing on the docket were settled out of court and dismissed.

The case of Eva B. Newlon vs. W. H. Crawford was ended after the hearing of one witness by an instructed verdict in favor of the defendant.

Cora P. Elliot was granted a divorce from Frank H. Elliot, with a stipulation as to property rights.

In the matter of S. J. Devine vs. Geo. White a compromise decision was made.

Red Cross Notes

A meeting of the executive committee of Morrow County Chapter, American Red Cross, was held in the council chamber Monday evening, the purpose being to devise ways and means for raising the balance yet due on the Christmas packet fund for sending Christmas boxes to the soldiers and sailors of the United States both at home and in foreign lands. Morrow county was originally asked to provide 275 of these boxes as her quota of the 1,675,000 required and the Heppner ladies undertook to provide that number at a cost of \$1.50 each. Recently, however, a second call came from headquarters asking for 210 additional boxes of like value. This additional requirement is rather burdensome on the Heppner organization so it was decided to make an apportionment of \$100 to the Ione auxiliary, \$50 to the Lexington auxiliary and to

ask Hardman school district and other outlying districts in the county to assist in raising the amount.

By an oversight in this column last week acknowledgement of the receipt of \$41 from the Strawberry school district for the Christmas box fund, was omitted.

The Red Cross Sale will be held Saturday, December 5, at Fair pavilion. Everyone is asked to donate all they can spare for this sale. Fancy work, towels, coated foods, cider or anything of value you have. High school students will call to collect articles donated.
