Tax Levy Fixed at 8.8 Mill

At the regular meeting of the county court last week the tax levy for the coming year was fixed at 8.8 mills. This includes state, county, road and school taxes, as against a levy of 9.4 last year. The valuation of property has been raised from \$12,547,695.00 last year to \$13,821,235.66 for the present year.

Of the levy made this year 2.5 mills is for road purposes or, in round numbers about \$35,000 for that purpose.
