Mr. Pearson is a true pioneer of that section having settled there more than 30 years ago when there were no railroads and the mail was carried by stage coach between Heppner and Pendleton. Mr. Pearson was postmaster at Lena in the early days and recounts many interesting experiences of pioneer life.

Heppner, were married in this city December 12, 1917. County Judge C. C. Patterson performing the ceremony, which was solemnized at his residence. Both parties are well and favorably known here and many friends will join in best wishes for their future happiness and prosperity.

early last week they received a telegram announcing the dangerous illness of Mrs. Ayer's father John Jones, of Portland.
