HEPPNER OFFERED

FREE DELIVERY

According to advices received recently from the Post Office Department by Postmaster Richardson. Heppner is in line for free delivery service as soon as the city can show that it has provided certain improvements required by the Department before the installation of free delivery. These improvements include suitable sidewalks, crosswalks, street signs and house numbers. Patrons of the office are required to provide proper receptacles for mail convenient for the carrier to facilitate the work of delivery.

These improvements must be provided before application for delivery is made or such application must carry assurance that such improvements will be provided within a reasonable time. One or more deliveries a day will be made as the public need demands.

Compensation for carriers will be \$55 per month to start with a yearly increase of \$90 after the first year.

Appropriations for this service have already been made and it now seems to be up to the people of Heppner to grab this opportunity to secure a modern convenience at practically no cost. We already have sidewalks and crosswalks practically all over town and the matter of street signs and house numbers is but a trifling expense at best and one that will more than pay for itself as a convenience to citizens and visitors aside from the matter of mail delivery.

Business and professional men, Commercial club members, city officials and all citizens should investigate this proposition and decide at once whether to accept or reject it.

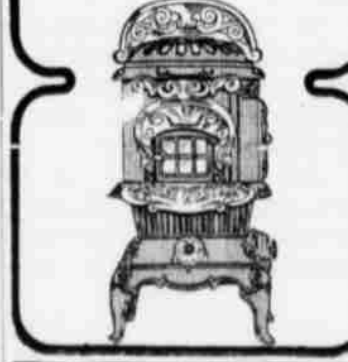
