SOME THINGS HEPPNER NEEDS

While the records of the year which has just passed shows Heppner to have made more material improvements than for many years, it is not well for her people to become self-satisfied over that fact and expect this growth to continue without any particular effort on their part. The building activity of the past year was not due to any excitement or "boom" efforts on the part of the people but rather that the time had arrived when the business of the town insistently demanded more room and better quarters.

While the Herald has no desire to see Heppner experience a "boom" in the meaning of that term as it was understood and practiced all along the coast a number of years ago, it does believe that there are other improvements the town needs to keep it in the front rank of progressive eastern Oregon cities.

One of the chief needs of the town, of course, is street improvements. No argument on this subject is needed other than for every citizen of the town to take a glance at the sea of mud which ebbs and flows along the strips of ground where Heppner's streets should be on this bright and beautiful New Year's morning of 1918. All will admit that it is not a pretty sight, it is not a money-making proposition, it is not conducive to health or cleanliness. Such streets are a blot on the fair name of the county seat of Morrow county, the county which led all the counties in these United States in the great Red Cross Christmas Membership Campaign which has just closed.

Another of Heppner's needs as a home town—a place where the people who make their money here will be encouraged to build good homes and live and keep their money here, is a more abundant supply of water for irrigation. This suggestion is not made in the spirit of criticism of any existing condition, but merely to call attention to a self-evident fact. A retrospective view of conditions last summer is the only argument needed in this case.

But, perhaps, the greatest need of the town and the one which, once provided, would ultimately solve all other community problems is a spirit of true co-operation among the people. We need to get together, we need to get acquainted with each other and discuss the many questions of public concern and then take hold and solve them in a way that will mean the greatest good to Heppner as a community. A Commercial Club with some sort of real get-together function once a month, luncheon, dinner or otherwise, might work wonders in Heppner's civic life. It would go far in fostering the community spirit and that spirit is Heppner's greatest need during the coming troublous days of 1918.

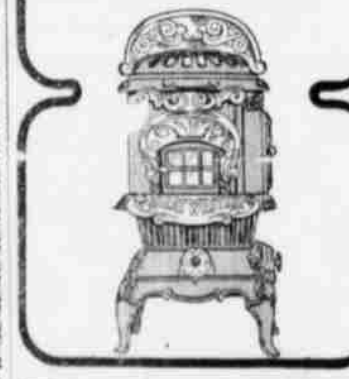
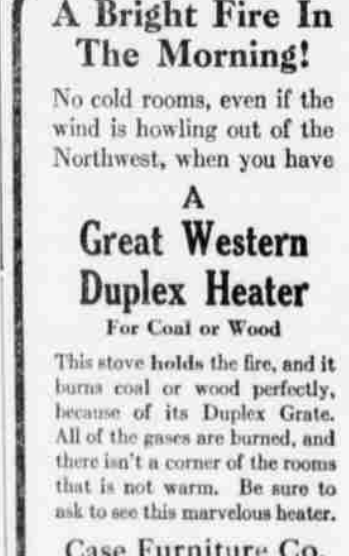
