To John W. Johnson, the above named defendant:

IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: You are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled action, on or before six weeks from the 22nd day of February, 1918, to-wit: On or before the 6th day of April, 1918, and if you fail to so appear or answer, for want thereof, the plaintiff will take judgment against you for the sum of \$537.75, with interest thereon at the rate of six per cent per annum from the 6th day of August, 1917; for the further sum of \$99.75, with interest thereon at the rate of six per cent per annum from the 6th day of August, 1917, for the further sum of \$25.00, with interest thereon at the rate of six per cent per annum from the 15th day of October, 1917, and for plaintiff's costs and disbursements of said action, also
