THE FLOUR SITUATION

Patriotic citizens in Oregon, as elsewhere, will not complain of the inconvenience caused by the further restrictions placed upon the purchase of flour and the requirement that with every pound of flour an equal amount of some substitute must be purchased.

However, many thousands of truly patriotic people are complaining and will continue to complain and to seriously object to the conditions now prevailing regarding the price of flour substitutes.

With a price fixed on wheat and flour, that is no doubt reasonable under war conditions, the people are denied the right to purchase that commodity except under restrictions, and are required to buy substitutes upon which no price has been fixed and which seems to be governed only by the cupidity of the men who control these products and who are in a position to fix the prices at whatever the traffic will bear.

There is already a rather insistent demand that the food administrator should fix a reasonable price on flour substitutes and that demand will probably grow still more insistent as the use of flour is still more curtailed and the prices of substitutes continue to advance.

It is one thing to talk and write about profiteering and another thing to take the food profiteer by the scruff of the neck and force him to cease his unholy practices and become, at least for the duration of the war, a decent and, at least to appearance, patriotic citizen.

Flour, Substitutes Now 50-50

The following telegram, received Monday by S. E. Notson, chairman of the Morrow County Food Conservation Committee, from W. B. Ayer, State Food Administrator, is self-explanatory:

"Owing to the absolute necessity that this country furnish wheat for shipment to our army abroad and to the people of France, I have received positive instructions that no sales of flour can be made without an equal quantity of substitute, and I am putting the order into effect today. This will undoubtedly inconvenience many of our people but they must thoroughly understand that it is an absolute necessity and the time has arrived when we are called upon to come through and do our full part. Please give full publicity."
