In Justice Cornett's court yesterday a retrial of the case of George Hamilton, charged with bootlegging, resulted in a verdict of acquittal. A former jury had failed to agree.

The defense in this case offered no evidence and made no argument to the jury. The case will be appealed to the circuit court.
