Continuing the article, which is too lengthy for our space, points out some of the things Mr. Stanfield has done for the sheep and wool industry of Oregon, which are of interest to every stockman in the state.

Mr. Stanfield's father was engaged in the cattle business in Umatilla county and failed in that business because of adverse market conditions. At his death young Robert, who was but a boy, was compelled to leave school to become the bread-winner for the family. He held on to the few cattle remaining from his father's herd and also engaged in the sheep business in a small way, and at a time when the sheep and wool business had reached their lowest ebb.

In building up better marketing methods for the wool crop he has also been an active leader with the result that Oregon growers are no longer buffeted from pillar to post by a combination of buyers who fixed prices to suit themselves and bluffed and bullied the growers into accepting them.

Mr. Stanfield has also been a leader in establishing woolgrowers' warehouses and in urging the establishment of wool scouring and woolen manufacturing plants in Oregon.

Eastern Oregon voters will not be influenced by such attacks from the supporters of an opponent as that quoted above for they know "Bob" Stanfield intimately and they know that he possesses the sort of ability Oregon needs in the U. S. Senate.

The products of the stockmen are recognized as of first importance in feeding our armies in Europe who are fighting the battle for world democracy and it is not right that this important industry should be the only one without competent representation either in congress or in any of the government departments at Washington.
