### Alva Jones Writes From France

France, March 3, 1918.

Dear Folks:

Just got through shaving and have a little time before supper, so here goes. We are having a little winter weather nowadays; it snowed nearly all night last night but the most of it has melted off today. It has been pretty nice all day, but I have been asleep most of the day; am working at night for about a week, then I change to the day time again.

There is nothing new here. I guess you know how the war is progressing; you likely got more news than we do. I got a letter from Henry Peterson the other day. He is getting along fine with the exception of a cold. I have not even had a cold while here; had a pretty bad one when I first landed but it was soon gone and have been feeling fine since. We have boots to wear when it is wet, so there is no need of having wet feet.

I see Frank Doble every once

in a while. He is here at the same place that I am, only in a different company. He seems to be getting along fine. There is another kid here from Ione by the name of Baker; he went to Camp Lewis the same time I did. And John Rourke, the first man that was drawn from Morrow county, is here in the same company with me. I saw a fellow the other day that used to go to school in Heppner. His name is Ellis and his dad worked on the Hamilton ranch for Art Minor. Then there is a fellow in this company that used to cook for Nick Groshens back of the saloon several years ago.

I guess I had better quit and go to supper. They feed over 300 at our kitchen now, and if a fellow don't get there pretty early he has to wait in line quite awhile.

So tell everyone hello for me and that I am fine and dandy.

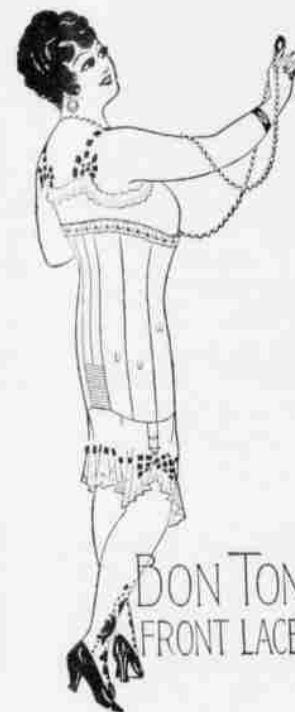
