THE THIRD LIBERTY LOAN

The campaign for placing the third Liberty Loan of \$3,000,000,000 will start tomorrow and Morrow county is called upon to subscribe for \$142,000 of that amount.

A thorough organization for this campaign has been worked out for the entire country and the more or less haphazard work of the first and second bond campaigns will be avoided.

Some people have already given and invested beyond their means, others have done nothing. By consulting the cards placed in his hands the solicitor may save time by passing up the first class mentioned and centering his efforts on those of the second class.

Cards of three colors will be furnished the workers. A blue card for those who do their full part in subscribing for bonds, a red card for those who do something, and a yellow card for those who are financially able to invest but who absolutely refuse to do anything.
