OVER THERE

The following message is from a citizen soldier of the United States National Army and should be read by every citizen of the United States. A way to help these boys who are fighting for democracy is to buy War Savings Stamps and Thrift Stamps, a war activity which seems to have been somewhat neglected so far in Morrow county.

"They say, who come back from 'over there,' that at night the troubled earth between the lines is carpeted with pain. They say that Death rides whistling in every wind and that the very mists are charged with awful torment. They say that, of all things spent and squandered, young human life is held least dear. It is not the pleasantest prospect for those of us who yet can feel upon our lips the pressure of our mother's goodbye kiss. But, please God, our love of life is not so prized as love of right. In this renaissance of our country's valor, we who will edge the wedge of her assault make calm acceptance of its hazards. For us, the steel-swept trench, the stiffening cold—weariness, hardship, worse, for you, for whom we go, you millions safe at home—what for you? We shall need food. We shall need care. We shall need clothes for our bodies and weapons for our hands. We shall need terribly and without failure, supplies and equipment in a stream that is constant and never ending. From you, who are our resource and reliance, who are the heart and hope of that humanity for which we strive and strive, must come these things."

Oregon Military Police

A company of Military Police is to be recruited in eastern Oregon for the purpose of preventing and detecting crime, apprehending criminals, protecting property, etc. J. W. Koeker has been appointed first lieutenant and recruiting officer for eastern Oregon, with headquarters at Condon.

The following circular has been sent out setting forth the purpose of the organization:

- 1. A body of state police to prevent and detect crime and apprehend criminals.
2. All male citizens of the United States between the ages of 18 and 45 years of age, physically qualified, are eligible for service in this body.
3. The term of enlistment will be for two years unless sooner discharged by proper authority.
4. The entire time of the personnel of the command will be given to their duties, exceptions being governed by regulations.
5. Remuneration for enlisted men, \$90 per month and up. Uniform and equipment furnished free.
6. For those who wish to serve their state and country in the abolishment of sedition and other crimes which are rampant during war, this service will be particularly interesting.
