Farm Labor Scarce

The following report on the farm labor situation comes to the Herald from the U. S. Employment service at Portland:

"The demand for farm labor is very much in excess of the supply. This office will place farm hands in steady positions at wages from \$50 to \$70 per month, room and board, for single men, and \$65 to \$85 for man and wife. Good milkers, and teamsters able to handle 4, 6 and 8-horse teams are also in demand. We can place good sheep herders in eastern Oregon, wages \$60 up, room and board.
