

United States Senator Charles L. McNary



Because United States Senator Charles L. McNary has made good he should be nominated to succeed himself in the Republican primary—May 17th.

From the day he became Senator he has loyally championed the prosecution of the war, and during his term of office has accomplished more for Oregon than any other member in Congress in a like period.

Favorable action from same committee on a bill authorizing the Secretary of the Interior to accept irrigation or district drainage bonds and exchange them with the Secretary of the Treasury for certificates of indebtedness, thereby providing funds for legitimate projects.

A ground aviation school for the University of Oregon.

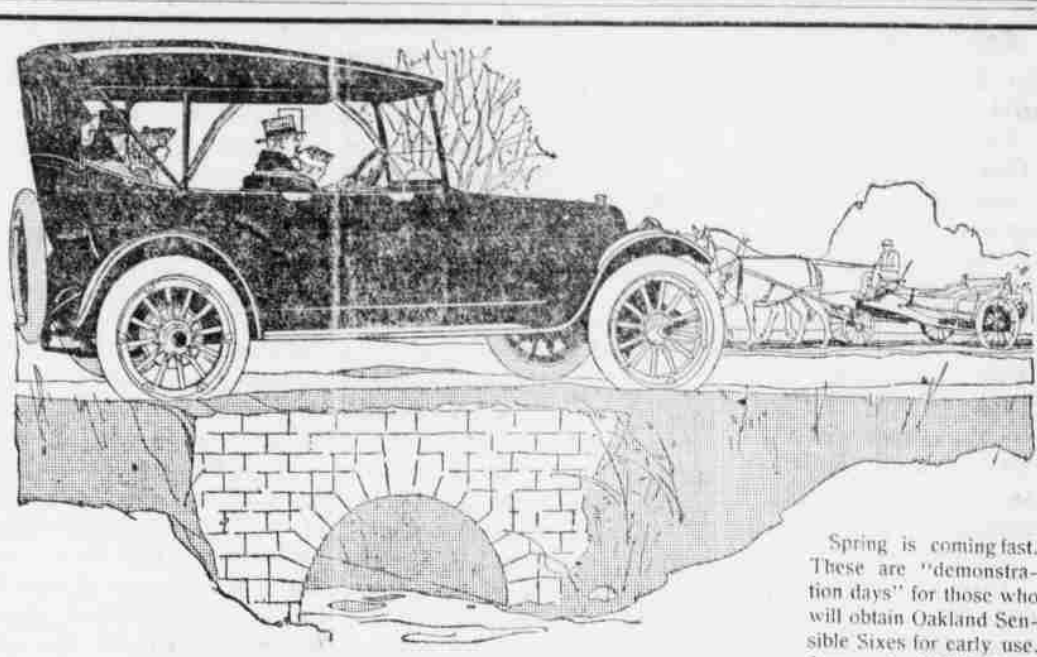
