FIRE COMPANY NEEDED

One lesson Heppner should learn from Monday's fire is that we need a well equipped, well trained volunteer fire company in this town pretty badly. Has such an organization been in existence Monday and had no delay in getting pressure occurred, the fire would probably have been put out before the opera house was entirely destroyed and all the other property would have been saved.

Much valuable time was lost at the start because of the lack of any organization or head. Men worked at cross purposes or did not work at all because there was no recognized authority to give orders. While much splendid work was done and each man and woman worked to the limit of endurance for the common good, yet it is probably a fact that if the wind had not changed just when it did the town would have been wiped out. What counts at a fire is to get there quick and put it out before it gets too big, and generally speaking, it takes a trained body of men to do that successfully.

At one time Heppner had the crack hose team in the state and it should have such an organization again. The town should get behind such an organization and the city council should give it proper recognition and financial assistance. Such an organization is needed and right now, before we have time to forget how badly scared we were last Monday, is a mighty good time to organize. We have the material for two teams here and at least two men now living in Heppner have had years of experience at the head of such organizations who would, no doubt, gladly give every assistance in organizing and training a team or two of efficient fire fighters.

THE HOME GUARDS

Thirty-two men of Heppner are active members of the Home guards and can be depended on to answer roll call every drill night. Some 72 names are on the muster roll but less than one-half find it possible or convenient to meet for regular drill practice.

A member of the guard who attends every meeting and who is earnestly active in the work, has suggested to the Herald that the boys are becoming somewhat discouraged because of the lack of interest shown by the people of the town. These men and boys believe there is an urgent necessity for such an organization here in order that life and

property in Heppner may be safeguarded in this time of stress, but they argue that if the people whose lives and property they are training themselves to protect are not sufficiently interested to turn out and see them drill, or in any way show interest in the organization it will not be much of a success. Heppner people should get behind the guard boys and let them know that their efforts toward home protection is appreciated.

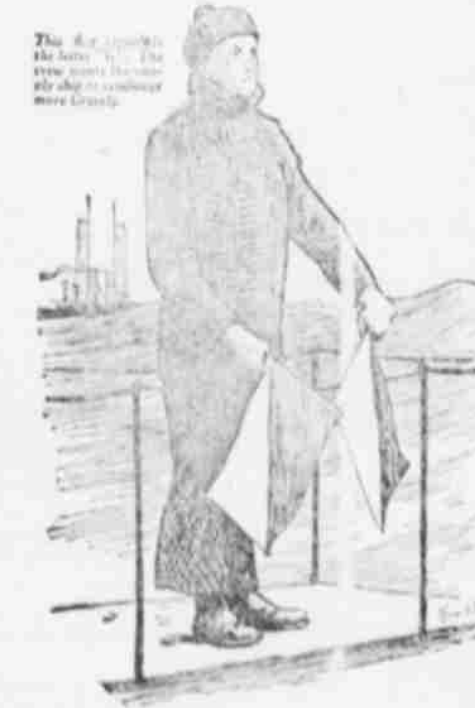
