Proclamation

The Fire Marshal Department of Oregon is making a special appeal to city officials of Oregon to assist in waging a campaign for a sane and safe Fourth of July.

The co-operation of all citizens is asked in order that all food supplies, war materials and other necessities to support our boys over the Sea may be fully protected.
