O'Rourke Makes Hit at Camp

The following interesting letter received by M. D. Clark from Billy O'Rourke, will be of interest to that young fighter's many friends in Morrow county, who will all hope to soon have the privilege of addressing him as Sergeant O'Rourke and later by a more pretentious title that will mean to him shoulder straps and a commission.

"I trust you are having as nice a time to-day as we are. Nothing to do but eat and lounge around and enjoy ourselves. Since my arrival here I have found out that hitherto I existed only, but now I am really alive. This army life, Clark, has the edge on anything I ever read about and you can bet that when this little scrap is over I'll stay right in the army if I can. To mix with all classes such as are here certainly gives a fellow a broader vision of human nature and when a fellow gets thru here, even if he's a trillionaire, he's just like the commoner who came in with him.

Let me tell you Clark that Morrow county can justly be proud of her fair haunch. Not a bone-head amongst them, all roaring to go and Kentucky stands right in the lead. He's certainly the greatest little devil I ever saw, always right in his place and the 25th Co. in which we are don't have to be ashamed of us one bit. This Co. is formed of all Eastern Oregon boys, all hard-boiled with few exceptions and on our first hike last Sunday to American Lake our sergeant said we were the pickiest bunch ever hit camp. Knapfack told him we were all professional shepherds and that they had not enough touch around in all Washington state to put us under—which I believe to be true.

Out of the 2000 head here on the 15th, 200 were turned down and the remaining 1800 were the best head board examines left, even in the Oregonian. Every company except ours for some reason. I myself, tho I hate to admit it, was turned down for a mistake of Wynnapp on my height, 5-11 1/2, in. when I really hit the 5-4 mark here. Have you Jimmy show you my letter and you'll see what a time I had trying to keep Morrow county's record open. But I'm here and accepted and they can't kick me out. We have lots of good cats, the hawks, and plenty of drill and games. We have the best company trail in the whole Teton range. Two big steamed bawber beds with a big 25 lb covers, in the center of each and the entire barracks is completely surrounded by chaffinuk peepies.

There are at least 200 here I know, scattered about, and we have a fine time.

Paul hats, cigarettes, guns and things a fellow never sees in civilian life. It makes a fellow feel good to step out in a few dollars and hit these paved streets and when 22 different words of jargon you to wrap up to attention. Some like Clark I wish you could see us. You'd be proud to know us. My relatives to be dis-

charged and asking for a reexamination went all over camp, and the Major sent down the Associated Press correspondent to have my picture taken and orders are orders, I had to stand for it tho I hated to. You ought to see my outfit. The first chance I have I'll send you a picture and you'll say I'm some soldier. The smallest man in the 25th Co. and not the worst either, in fact already I am a guide and the 1st Lieut. told me yesterday to report some day this week for examination as a non-com. officer. So maybe in a little while you will be writing to Sergeant O'Rourke, sounds pretty good. Well Clark, I'm about due for a good meal and I'll have duty this afternoon. I'll finish now and mail so you hear from me to-morrow. Tell Mrs. Clark and Mary and Marjorie hello for me and tell Mary to wear my necktie all the time. I wrote several letters to Heppner but so far got only one answer. But really, Clark, a fellow has so much to do he don't feel the least bit lonesome. Be sure you see Kenny's letter and send me both papers when you're through with them and I'll be obliged. TH I hear from you sometime. I will be a good boy and try to lose no chance to elevate myself. Give Bally and all the store my best wishes and to you and all the family I am
