War Emergency Course and Certificate

Oregon Normal School

Owing to the scarcity of teachers the Oregon Normal School will offer a War Emergency Course of twenty weeks outlined by the Superintendent of Public Instruction. The course will begin with each of the terms commencing November 16, 1918; February 8, 1919; and April 12, 1919. The Superintendent of Public Instruction will consider it equivaent to the Teachers' Training Course and issue a certificate upon its completion valid to teach in the elementary grades for one year.

This Course will be open to those who have had two years or more of high school work or its equivalent and who are at least eighteen years of age.
