THE JOHN DAY PROJECT

Speaking of the John Day irrigation project it may be said that little mention of it is ever heard in Heppner. Not that Heppner people are opposed to it but that the Herald terms of approval—but somehow they are not particularly interested in it and so far have not given it attention.

The Herald has not the figures at land which might be covered by the project nor the tentative estimates of cost of construction but it may safely be said that it is one of the biggest projects yet considered in the west. A large amount of the acreage which the project would reclaim is located in the northern part of this county and it is generally conceded that with an abundance of water the light, sandy soil of that section would equal the best land in the west in point of productivity. This fact has already been demonstrated by the lands under irrigation at Boardman, Irrigon, Hermiston and other sections within the Umatilla project.

While it is true that the completion of the John Day project would not furnish water for the lawns and war gardens in Heppner it is a fact that it would so enhance the material wealth of Morrow county, of which Heppner is the county seat and most important city, that we would be bound to receive wonderful benefit in our commercial, social, educational and civic life.

In a country such as this no town can be other than what the surrounding country makes it. Were it not

for the wheat farms and cattle and sheep ranges which are tributary to Heppner the town would die. Our wealth is only a reflection of the prosperity of the farmers and stockmen and, if you please, every other good thing that the town enjoys is but a reflection of the good there is in those around us.

Heppner is or should be vitally interested in any project that is bound to increase the wealth and population of Morrow county, and it is generally conceded that the John Day project will do just that.

There are those who say that nothing can be done with such a project as this until the war is over and that when that time comes and the urgent need for more land for the returning soldiers becomes apparent that the government will have to do the work. These people should remember that there are other sections in the country open to development under irrigation projects and that the people who are interested in securing such development are already advancing the claims of their sections to the proper authorities. Our neighbors in the north end of the county and in Umatilla county are already getting busy on the John Day project and they admit that the scheme may require years of hard fighting to put it over but it is worth the effort. Heppner people should get in and do their bit in this matter. It is no fake scheme. It is a big project well worth the very best effort of the best people in Morrow county and in this important work Heppner should lead the way.

PRIEST HOLDS SERVICE

Rev. Father P. Kilkenny, recently appointed a chaplain in the U. S. army and assigned to duty at Camp Lewis, who was the guest of his brother John Kilkenny and other friends here, last week, preached a splendid sermon in the Catholic church last Sunday to a large congregation.

The reverend gentleman chose as his theme "Our Relation to God" and his discourse was highly interesting and instructive. Many of his auditors were old boyhood friends in Ireland and the service was all the more enjoyed because of that fact.

Rev. Kilkenny left Monday for Camp Lewis to take up his work among the men in the training camp.

NEW FIRM ORGANIZED

Mr. McMenamin as a live stock auctioneer, as is attested by the fact that his services in that line are sought in all parts of this and adjoining counties. The new firm will also maintain an income tax department and their extensive experience in that line will be at the service of their clients.

Mr. Brown, who has efficiently filled the position of County Agricultural agent for Morrow county for the past year, has resigned that position to take effect as soon as a suitable man can be found to take his place, and until such a man is found he will continue in the duties of county agriculturist while Mr. McMenamin will look after the business of the Farmers' Exchange.

W. E. Cummings, who farms extensively in the Spring Hollow country, was in town Wednesday and paid the Herald a pleasant visit while having his subscription account chalked up for another year. Mr. Cummings is seeding some 450 acres this fall and he says the

ground is in fine condition for the work. A heavy crop of filigree covers the summer fallow making digging necessary which he says is a good thing for the soil and the crop. It does make extra work.

RETURNS FROM MINE

Dan B. Salter, president and general manager of the Mayflower group of rich mining claims in the Greenhorn district, has returned to Heppner for the winter after spending the summer at the mines where he was carrying on development work. The scarcity of labor and the difficulty of securing supplies interfered with the work to a considerable extent but in spite of this a large amount of high grade ore has been uncovered and blocked out. War conditions have interfered with the extension of the Sunnyside Valley railway into the district this year, but when convenient transportation is established the property will become an important producer.
