SANITY IN STATE ROAD BUILDING

There is an evident disposition to give the ten-year paving contract its chance, as the romance writers would put it. The Telegram can only reiterate its approval of that which it has noted many a time and oft. The ten-year contract and the whole kit and "boodle" of patent paving monopoly should be dismissed with as little ceremony as possible.

It is refreshing to be told that there is prospect of legislative awakening as to the fate of those deplorable consumptions and we are induced to the belief and entertained the hope that the others will follow as a matter of course.

It perhaps would be difficult to establish that any one phase of the patent paving monopoly is less desirable than another, but for example that relies for success on an amazing credulity commend us to the ten-year contract. If there was ever a blinder scheme for getting something for nothing, and being amused over the simplicity of it, that scheme has never been brought to our attention.

Against the terms of the ten-year contract, to which the public is the party of the one part and the patent paving company is the party of the other part, and it will be found that the only suggestion it contains is that the public shall pay the patent paving company certain compensation for maintenance during a period when there is no maintenance expense. So far as the paving company is concerned it is "everything coming in and nothing going out."

When the time arrives for the highway to wear out, or when it should begin to show signs of wearing out, this so-called sanity is an elevator drawn that the paving company evades responsibility for every contributing cause for which in any honest business arrangement it should have been held liable. The ten-year contract is not and never has been worth the paper it was written upon.

And with this beginning, why should we falter in attaining to sound business principles in road building? Why longer be lashed up and insulted with a patent process for extracting a dollar and a half for every dollar's worth of road furnished? We have been victimized in this fashion long enough. The time is opportune to take road building in our own hands, and get rid of the patent fetish and all its ticks, and when we spend a dollar for road building, spend it in such a way that the full value of it will remain in Oregon and be realized by the public. —Portland Telegram.

St. Winnifred and the Tree

One story of the origin of the green tree as the Christmas tree among the people of northern Europe is given in a legend of St. Winnifred. It is one of the many thousands of those simple and beautiful beliefs that have attached themselves to the midwinter festival and which generally pass now under the name of "Christmas myths." It is related that St. Winnifred, a great Christian missionary, began cutting down a "sacred" oak which had been the object of worship by the northern pagans whom he was seeking to lead aright. While he was hewing down the huge tree it was blasted by a sudden whirlwind. Close beside it was a young fir tree, which was not harmed either by the whirlwind or by the fall of the giant oak. Then St. Winnifred is reported to have spoken as follows to the pagans:

"This little tree, a young child of the forest, shall be your holy tree tonight. It is the wood of peace, for your homes are built of it. It is the sign of an endless life, for its leaves are always green. See how it points toward heaven! Let this be called the tree of the Christ Child. Gather about it; not in the wild woods, but in your homes; there it will shelter no floods of blood, but loving gifts and acts of kindness." The fir tree, the common evergreen of the northern regions, became the holy tree of the converted pagans, and in its honor or in memory of the thoughts it stood for they decorated it with lights and gifts at Christmas.

Safety First

- Don't allow children to touch the lighted tree.
- Don't remove presents from the tree while it is lighted.
- Don't leave anything highly inflammable near the tree.
- Don't set the tree up haphazardly. Be sure it is securely fastened so it will not tip over easily.
- Don't blow a candle out. The flame might be carried against a dry branch and set fire to the whole tree.
- Don't fasten any flammable ornament near any lights on the tree. If one should ignite the blaze would spread all over the tree.

Don't forget to fasten the candles securely to the tree if candles are used. Also avoid placing them under another branch.

Always have a wet sponge convenient to the tree. A candle often burns up too quickly, and the sponge could be used to extinguish it.

Don't leave the tree until you are sure the lights are all extinguished, and never trust the work of extinguishing the lights to children.

Don't light the tree after it has stood in a warm room for three or four days. It becomes so dry it will burn almost as quickly as powder.

Don't trim the tree with cotton to represent snow. Use an asbestos preparation which looks like cotton. This applies particularly to those who illuminate their trees with candles.

Don't light the trees with anything

but electric bulbs, if possible. Where it is impossible to use electricity never leave the lighted tree alone and never allow children in the room unless accompanied by a grown-up person.

Don't set the tree up near upholstered furniture. The danger of sparks setting it afire is great. A piece of such furniture might smolder for hours without being discovered—probably not until the family has been in bed some time.
