CHRISTMAS

NEVER before since that eventful morning when the wise men from the east were guided by a gleaming star to the Galilean stable in whose manger reposed in cradled obscurity the new-born Babe of Bethlehem, has equal cause existed for all the people of Christendom to celebrate the anniversary of that wonderful day in the true spirit of the teachings of Him who first gave to the world the doctrine of "Peace on earth, good will to men."

For nearly twenty centuries the world has professed to accept the teachings of Jesus and to be guided by his precepts while in practice it has too often been governed by the doctrine of hate. Through all these centuries the history of mankind has been written in blood, the face of the earth has been disfigured with the awful spectacle of war.

With each succeeding Christmas the world has preached of peace, and love and gentleness and then gone forth the next day or the next month or year to main, to kill and to destroy. The present, however, gives promise of the coming of a new era. Following the horrors of four years of a war-mad world tomorrow's Christmas morn will dawn on a world already laying plans by which it is hoped that permanent peace will be established. The world is sick of war; the times are ripe for peace and there is much reason to expect that when the coming peace conference shall have finished its work the superstructure of a world peace will have been started the foundation of which will trace back to the teachings of the Bethlehem Babe, the Man of Galilee, the Prince of Peace.

EASTERN OREGON MUST STAND ALONE

That Eastern Oregon must stand alone in the work of development of her latent resources has long been patent to all close students of the situation. That the John Day project, if constructed, (and it will be constructed) will stand as a monument to the brains and energy and progressiveness of the men and women of the big Oregon country which lies east of the Cascade range is made more and more apparent every time an effort is made to cooperate in any state development work with our neighbors to the west of that range.

That the people of Portland and western Oregon have not yet been able to raise to the sublime height that should enable them to cast their vision over the snow-capped peaks of the Cascades into the promised land that lies beyond, is as plain as the nose on a homely man's face.

These observations are inspired by reading the meagre accounts which appeared in the Portland newspapers relative to the recent convention in the Rose City at which the Oregon Chamber of Commerce was brought into being.

That convention was heralded all over the state as the time and place when the live wires of all Oregon would join in a mighty, concerted movement to put old Oregon on the map. No distinction was to be made between the different sections. There was to be no eastern Oregon, no southern Oregon, no western Oregon and no Portland known at the love feast. The Oregon Chamber of Commerce was to be as big as all of Oregon and the men comprising it were to be as big as the movement itself as well as truly representative of every important industry or meritorious project.

The result of this much heralded convention was as to be expected. Western Oregon grabbed the Oregon Chamber of Commerce, by the nape of the neck, dragged it into his cave and proceeded to stick its cuticle as full of western Oregon officials and committeemen as hades is reputed to be filled with fiddlers.

Morrow county sent down a delegation loaded to the guards with facts and figures concerning irrigation and particularly the John Day project and... so far as we are able to judge by the Portland newspaper reports the John Day project got about as much attention from that convention as a coal peddler would receive in the nether regions.

One trouble with western Oregon is that they think Oregon is bounded by the Pacific ocean and the summit of the Cascade range. Another trouble is that they are so busy promoting stump land booms, pulling themselves out of the mud both in a literal and figurative sense, and grousing at what congress and the rest of the world does not do for their especial benefit that they never have had time to study the geography of their own state.

The John Day project is easily the biggest reclamation proposition now under consideration and yet Portland and western Oregon refused it recognition. The delegation who went down there from Morrow county to work for the cause of irrigation in general and the John Day project in particular were entitled to recognition in that convention. They were entitled by all means to a place on the committee on irrigation. What did they get? A place on the committee on membership. And that's Portland and western Oregon every time.
