GAZETTE-TIMES EDITORIAL ENDORSED

It gives the Herald great pleasure to republish and endorse the following paragraph clipped from an editorial in the Gazette-Times of last week:

"That Heppner did not get some of the leading places among the officers of the organization (State Chamber of Commerce) should be no cause of complaint. Heppner is not entitled to the chief seats. She has a commercial organization at the present in name only; it is doing no active work and has done none for months past, and the State Chamber of Commerce is so constituted and organized as to give proper recognition to the live ones. When Heppner gets a move on and organizes a real, honest to goodness commercial club, with a live, wideawake membership, she will take her place among the other cities of the state that are going out and getting the things they want."

Our neighbor has exactly the right idea about the lack of and the need for a live, active commercial organization in Heppner. Without such an organization Heppner and Morrow county will certainly lag behind other towns and counties in the state in the coming period of reconstruction and development. The Herald is strong for any movement that promises development and progress and growth and prosperity for Heppner and Morrow county and this means every part of Morrow county from the Columbia river to the most remote mountain ranch towards our southern boundary.

To organize and keep alive an active commercial club in Heppner, however, will mean the hearty and honest co-operation of every wide awake, progressive citizen and institution in the city and in this work the newspapers of the town can render a good service. If our neighbor really wants a live commercial club and will go ahead and lead the way in this matter the Herald gives assurance of its hearty co-operation in the movement. The Herald knows that it can never succeed in helping to advance the material development and prosperity of Morrow county by opposing any worthy project simply because it was first mentioned by a competitor. That sort of spirit never built up any community. Neither will the idea that Heppner can afford to rest on her oars and depend on the State Chamber of Commerce putting through the John Day project and handing it over as a reward of merit for us having a live commercial club or for only needing one, get us any where. The Herald still maintains that when it comes to getting big things that this section of the state really needs, "Eastern Oregon Must Stand Alone," regardless of C. C. Chapman's generalities so copiously quoted by our neighbor last week.

As to the "tears" to which our neighbor refers the Herald man does not claim to have established much of a reputation as a "sob sister" during his residence in Heppner. Besides, he has found, are more comfortable and satisfactory under all circumstances and as to them being "crocodile tears" cannot our neighbor give us credit for being as sincere in this matter as he was in the Tuttle affair or the alleged election law infringement?

THE POWER OF MIND

THE fact as stated by Surgeon General Ireland that "more than 2000 American soldiers in France suffering from shell shock were cured by the news of the signing of the armistice" is an interesting contribution to the pathology of nervous diseases. These war hospital patients were not suffering from an imaginary ailment; the physical manifestations of their affliction were apparent; amounting in some cases to bodily disfigurement. Yet the cure seems to be entirely due to the influence of the imagination, being instantly affected by their realization that they would not again be subjected to the same experience.

This evidence of the mind's power over the body will afford great satisfaction to believers in the efficacy of mental or spiritual methods of healing. What have the materialists to say about it? Psychologists will allege the capacity of their art to cure disease of this nature and according to a statement from the surgeon general's office, "improved methods of combating the affliction" in army hospitals have materially reduced it.

Yet the fact remains of nature's dramatic and immediate cure by the simple means of removing apprehension. Medical practice has still some way to go before equaling this demonstration of the great possibilities in mental healing.—New York World.
