A GOOD BILL TO KILL

S ENATE BILL, No. 31, introduced by Senator Orton, of Multnomah county, is a pretty good one for the leg islature to choose for early slaughter. The bill proposes to create a Department of State Police consisting of a superintendent at a salary of \$3,000 per annum; a deputy super intendent at a salary of \$2,400 per annum and twelve officers at a salary of \$1,500 each, per annum. The superintendent shall also be provided with "suitable offices" at Portland. The sum of \$60,000 is appropriated to pay the salaries and foot the bills of this department or an average of around \$4,300 for each of the fourteen men. This is considerably more money than the average eastern Oregon sheriff draws for performing, faithfully and well, the responsible duties of his office which includes not only the duties of chief peace officer of his county but also that of

The sheriff of a county is elected by the people who know him and who are acquainted with his qualifications and character. He is the choice of a majority of the people and, if found recreant to his trust, he is amenable to the people and subject to their recall at any time.

Under the provisions of this act the members of the State Police Department are to be clothed with "the same power with respect to criminal matters" as is the sheriff within his particular jurisdiction but by the same token, afive. Whether right or wrong in their actions the state policeman will be in a position to snap their fingers at the people as long as they have the backing and support of the superintendent of the Department who appointed them.
